- Amplify the voices and concerns of the public review and report on issues that affect local people
- Drive improvement in public services consider the work of partners and other public organisations which affect local residents
- Contribute to the development of future policies and strategies that will help improve services for local people
- Involve local people in council decision making
- Co-ordinate the Councillor Call for Action

This document sets out the priorities, outcomes and actions which relate directly to the Economy Scrutiny Panel and forms the basis of its work programme for the next municipal year. It also provides a guide for prioritising items for scrutiny.

This document is 'work in progress; the updating of the work programme is an ongoing task. The work programme in detail describes the panel's desired outcomes, objectives, intentions, outputs and progress. Topics may be added or withdrawn to react to changing priorities.

## 2. Terms of reference

The scrutiny panels are responsible for scrutinising any matters affecting North East Lincolnshire within their remit. For the Economy Scrutiny Panel these include:

- ♦ Economic strategy
- ♦ Economic development
- External funding and inward Investment (including renewable energy)
- ♦ Regeneration projects
- ♦ Local enterprise and growth
- Regeneration Partnership performance monitoring
- ♦ Local Plan

- Transport and traffic regulations (including parking)
- Business and education partnerships
- ♦ Strategic housing
- Asset management (including business centres)
- ♦ Flood risk management
- ♦ Energy and climate change
- ♦ Empty and derelict property
- Emergency planning and civil contingencies



## 3. Scrutiny of the budget

A key element of the work programme is annual scrutiny of the Council's proposed priorities and budget prior to formal approval by Cabinet and Council in February 2022.

The Executive Scrutiny Liaison Board will determine how budget scrutiny, performance monitoring issues and matters of a corporate nature which affect the Council as a whole, are dealt with.

## 4. The Council Plan

The council plan sets out the priorities for this council and is due to be initially considered by Cabinet in July 2021. The plan will then need to be referred to scrutiny prior to eventual agreement by full Council. As set out above, the panel's work programme remains a flexible document and may need to be adjusted to reflect this panel's role in monitoring council plan priority interventions within its remit. It is anticipated that the scrutiny panels will receive regular updates on progress with the key actions contained within the council plan.



## 5. Focus for the Economy Scrutiny Panel –

The forward work programme of each scrutiny panel should be linked to the delivery of the council's priority outcomes. The work of this scrutiny panel must be focussed on these priorities when making recommendations on important policy matters and must hold the executive and other decision makers to account on those terms. It is important that panels maintain this focus when examining issues and setting agendas. At its March 2021 meeting, members were given the opportunity to identify potential items for the panel's 2021/22 programme.

### Panel suggestions March 2021:

- Aspects related to COVID recovery plan including effect on current programmes.
- Implementation of the freeport proposal (update in 6 months with full business case.) Including impact on SHIIP programme
- Economic strategy review, influence (gap analysis and monitoring delivery of strategy) (Joint with TVE?)
- Housing Strategy (empty homes, social housing update (and how we influence output/outcomes), other focussed updates. (from 2020/21 Housing Zone Action Sites / Playing Pitch Strategy)
- Monitoring the delivery of the Town Centre Master Plan (outputs), including evaluating success (outcomes), Definitions of success criteria.
- Carparking strategy (especially in relation to other strategies e.g. Town Centre masterplan)

The panel will also continue monitoring via regular reporting on :

- key projects (included in the council's commissioning plan (outcome framework).
- Highways schemes
- Local transport plan
- Monitoring the performance of the regeneration partnership via quarterly report
- Monitoring the improvement of the regeneration partnership via regular reporting.
- Financial monitoring via quarterly budget reports

The panel retains its interest in the following topics carried over from the scrutiny annual report.

- Gypsy and traveller designated stopover site pre cabinet
- Energy Programme/ carbon energy roadmap regular updates
- Local plan review

These were considered by the panel at a work programme workshop on 15 June 2021 where the following topics were also agreed:
