

Climate Change and Environment Survey 2021

During the period August to September 2021, the Council ran a climate change and environment survey, which was available on the website. The survey had 684 total responses from the public, of which 557 were complete and 127 were incomplete.

The information given in this document includes all the responses given in free text boxes, as we received them, with no alterations.

Summary

The key findings of this survey were that 84% of respondents said that they are concerned about climate change, with 93% stating that they are making a conscious effort to reduce their own carbon footprint. Respondents also supported the following six key priorities, for the council to implement, to achieve Carbon Net Zero by 2050: making public buildings energy efficient, changing all council vehicles to use sustainable fuels, using energy efficient street lighting, buying more sustainable goods and services, placing environmental impact at the heart of decision making, and encouraging staff behaviour change to move towards more environmentally sustainable practices.

Additionally respondents agreed with the collaborative approach to achieve carbon net zero by 2050, by working with others on the following points: supporting businesses to improve efficiency of commercial buildings, making transport greener through network investment and policy change, supporting our local industries to reduce their carbon emissions, supporting sustainable new housing

as a policy maker and planning authority, supporting our partners and residents to improve old houses to become more sustainable, and encouraging community engagement and sustainability actions.

In response to the survey, all the following actions received support to help manage carbon emissions and tackle climate change in North East Lincolnshire: planting more trees and plants, more pedestrianisation of areas, giving priority to bicycles and public transport over cars in urbanised areas, more renewable energy powered vehicle infrastructure (e.g., electric vehicle charging points), supporting renewable energy generation, seeking additional decision-making power and resources from Central Government, setting tougher environmental standards for new developments, and insulating and updating public buildings.

Over 81% of respondents felt that it was either extremely important or very important to them that the council acts to improve biodiversity within the borough. Additionally, 90% believed that green infrastructure should be a key method to help us tackle climate change. Respondents thought that the following areas were extremely important for improving green infrastructure: policy and planning, air quality, water management (e.g., Lakes, Ponds, and flood defence), education and community involvement, trees and woodlands, and parks and open spaces. 94% of respondents felt that health and wellbeing should be a key reason for improving green infrastructure in North East Lincolnshire. Respondents also supported the following actions to help improve our green infrastructure: increasing tree coverage in the borough, improving access to open spaces and parks, increasing the amount of sustainable drainage used in the borough, increasing wildflower areas in the borough, working to help establish more allotments and community gardens, embedding green infrastructure in all new developments, preserving and enhancing current green infrastructure, improving community/volunteer involvement and engaging with community groups, providing information and guidance on green infrastructure, and establishing wildlife corridors in the borough.

A small number of words and sentences have been removed and replaced with the word *REDACTED*, where those responses were deemed to be offensive, discriminatory, personal, or used inappropriate language.

You didn't support the priority to make public buildings energy efficient. Please tell us why:
Because its a complete waste of public money and will make zero difference.
Because of the way it is done - knock on effect on environment/people not considered previously by NELC. Tick box exercise not a considered, rounded project.
Because it is a waste of money
Efficiency of service to public should be the priority

Utilise and regenerate existing housing before building on green-field sites. Do not build the Grimsby West Relief Road which will increase emissions
Prioritise our green field sites and nature reserves. Keeping these in tact is essential for wildlife and for keeping our carbon footprint down. Also renovating and restoring the centre of Grimsby town and getting people back in empty housing rather than building more houses.
Regenerating existing buildings and sites instead of building on greenfield sites.
Stop building or approval to build on greenfield sites. These are more important than ever before. We don't need new housing we need to restore or upgrade the abandoned houses of Grimsby. You keep building all the new stuff on the edge of town and leave the Center to rot, people will stop coming.
Keeping green spaces green and utilise existing housing and brown spaces for new housing
The development of housing already in the area that is an eye sore and run down, rather than building on green space that is a wildlife haven and a mental health haven for many. The impact of building on green space when not rejuvenating the areas that are already run down is completely against the grain of helping the environment. Recycling
Stop building houses on Greenfield sites
Recycling: If shops, ie co-op, can collect and recycle plastic waste that 'springs back when you scrunch it' then the council should be able to offer this too or at the very least promote the initiative taken by the co-op. Other supermarkets offer battery recycling points and plastic bag recycling, it would be great to see these adopted by the council. The battery recycling could be on a neighbourhood basis and the plastic bags put in with the plastic and tins in the black bin. Food recycling needs to be implemented. I understand that this is being evaluated, but seriously NELC, get your act together, other towns have had this for 10 years and more. Just think what a difference that would make to your carbon footprint. People should be able to have extra bins if it means they recycle. Obviously a family of 2 will have a lot less than a family of 6, but both get the same size bin. Waste in green bins should be occasionally checked and if the householder has recyclable items in their green bin, they should be contacted and advised of their errors. Also, brown garden waste bins should not be charged for, a £3 per month increase on the council tax would more than cover this, for houses with gardens, that is and there should also be garden waste collection points in easily accessible places, not just the recycle centre (tip). The council could house these recycling areas in locked, roofed and fenced areas where the only entry would

be by a code given out by the council. That way, if fly tippers left rubbish in them, there would be a better chance of detecting them. All known fly tipping areas should have covert surveillance. Two that I encounter regularly have trees nearby that an outdoor trail camera could be fitted to and hey presto! the council has the information they need to prosecute. These remote cameras would only need accessing if there is an incidence or for maintenance, ie new batteries.
Fly tipping, in ally ways especially. Fine people who fly tip more heavily
More funding and support to local services.
Improve walking & cycling infrastructure

With regard to my 'not sure' on lighting, please consider if these energy saving lights 'flicker' in any way as this may be harmful to those who suffer with migraines and photosensitive epilepsy.

Providing affordable energy efficient housing for the under paid
Policies that encourage local businesses to educate their staff on the science and reality of climate change through corporate training. George Marshall and his team at the climate communications thinktank at Climate Outreach have identified this as one of the key levers national and local government have in this context.
Encourage people to dispose of their litter by having more litter bins available especially on all routes around Fast Food restaurants. Lakeside Parkway has a couple of dog waste bins but NO waste bins. You should employ wardens to ask irresponsible dog owners to clean up after their pets!
Helping people to use cars less by providing better public transport.
Stop building on all green areas. Regenerate areas/buildings where there are facilities & transport links to reduce the need for more vehicles.
Limit new house building, refresh the town centre, freeman street area to provide housing as opposed to green field sites
Looking after the elderly and helping them to make the necessary changes.
Roads, litter, rubbish collection, presentation of the town (grass verges kept cut etc)
Litter and rubbish dumped in fly tips, alleyways, roadsides and rivers.
Better, cheaper and more reliable public transport to reduce car use
Not building unnecessary roads and homes thus destroying natural habitats (such as the Freshney Valley chalk stream area). Such projects would obviously INCREASE the carbon footprint whilst simultaneously destroying and removing the biodiversity of the area. You must stop this insane record of extremely bad planning ideas in the area (such as the Grimsby town centre paving debacle). It's also time to stop the superficial priorities you have that only scratch the surface of the problem. This whole climate situation really is an emergency that is going to affect the whole global population (and not only human life), as well as the future of the planet. It's time to get BIG with plans and priorities, not wishy washy whimsical wishes. And stop building homes on green land! Another priority should be to increase the tree coverage of the area as it has one of the lowest tree coverage levels in the country.

Giving traffic priority to cyclists/ public transport. Making public transport more accessible in terms of routes, frequencies, price. Working with transport providers to incentivise using public transport at certain times of the day and night or for key events around the county. Giving incentives to home owners to keep gardens and green space rather than paving space over.

Planting trees - sadly NE Lincs is one of the bottom 10 boroughs for trees in the UK Not enough green spaces - the borough is short on parks
promoting and prioritising cycle lanes and routes across north east Lincs so that people are more open to not using their cars but using bicycles instead. Incentive schemes of cycle and not drive.... Extension of public transport (smaller buses to include tailift for wheelchairs to outlying villages to enable elderly and infirm to travel to Grimsby and Cleethorpes centres (currently using taxis or dial a ride which does not have enough availability for the need). Contracting cleaning services that don't use plastic or at least use recyclable materials and
Eliminate methane emissions from landfill sites. Construct incineration facilities with carbon storage and capture for domestic waste in order to generate electricity. Introduce hydrogen fuel for domestic homes. Encourage local industry to collaborate in carbon reduction/removal schemes and encourage farmers to improve biodiversity and the environment. Investigate whether district heating schemes could be made viable by recovering low grade heat from industrial plant for local housing located nearby (ie. heat that would otherwise be exhausted to atmosphere).

The potentials could be explored with turning waste streams into biomass for fertiliser, biogas, e.t.c.. utilising recycled food waste for making compost to return to

the ground to sustain established planting schemes in the borough.

Urban agriculture would also reduce freight food miles. A local move towards that future food security model is even more relevant post Brexit. Again Co2 is captured by growing food & by planting schemes.

Encouraging cycling & walking, Personal Electric Transport & anything that doesn't rely on fossil fuel combustion would help too.

Shoring up the coastal defences & Grimsby's dock gates would be a smart move, we've been close to breach before now & the flood map projections show a grim future reality.

Heroes!! Is what you could be if you can give yourselves an 'elegant exit' from the grimsby west expansion by doing something radical...be the council that LEADS environmental improvement. You have such a great opportunity and so many people would support you and we know you can do it really really well if you want to. Think about the legacy you leave, not just as a council but individual people. You get to SAVE wildlife and we would love and thank you for it. All our council is notorious for is bodged block paving and failed roundabout projects. Think about the best legacy you can leave, say that you have listened to people. Dont build on Greenfield sites. Leave the freshney valley alone. Not destroying the chalk stream or the habitats of abundant wildlife as part of the 'levelling up' work. Any person brave enough and forward thinking enough to put the environment first, wherever it is, and that acts compassionately to support wildlife that cant help themselves is a hero in my eyes. Encourage natural habitat in the wild

Utilise brownfield sites more effectively for any housing needs

Encourage the use of recycling centres rather than making it difficult with rules such as:

- a maximum of three types of waste and/or recyclable materials at any one time
- small quantities of wood/MDF in a van or trailer
- Soil and rubble (maximum of three bags per household per day)
- Clean Plaster Board only. Contaminated plasterboard with insulation / foil / plaster attached to it is not accepted.

You always talk about greener future helping the local area so on and so on you're new idea for a greener future is to build yet another road (more traffic in and around the local area) along with this you back plans for 3500+ houses (more people bigger carbon point) and this plan you back for a greener future is set to wipe out the most natural untouched place this area has you nelc are a joke how does this give this area a greener future??

By preserving the green spaces and decreasing carbon emissions by NOT building more and more unneeded housing or roads which will produce more carbon emissions in construction and habitation if new homes and encouraging more cars on to the roads. Green spaces absorb carbon so the destruction of these areas is obviously detrimental to the environment. Plough money into current empty homes and develop the areas that need investment and encourage businesses to thrive (Grimsby Town centre, East & West Marsh areas). Hold landlords accountable for poor state of properties they own enforce house insulation, roofs to be in good order, new energy efficient boilers/ heating, guttering to be in good repair to reduce chances of damp. Making public transport more readily available, especially on the outskirts of the town e.g Laceby, Healing, Keelby and more affordable to those on low incomes and to run a more regular service.

Cycling has had a great push over the last few years but it's not something everyone can do. Pedestrians are mostly forgotten and run the gauntlet trying to cross roads without proper crossings, long distances to get to crossings or no time between light sequences. These, along with cyclists bullying them off pavements, are pushing pedestrians into cars - motorists are not the bottom of the food chain now, pedestrians are. We need to properly promote walking, not just putting up 'stride' signs but by making it safer to walk without having to battle with cyclists or drivers.

Plant more trees and create more wild natural corridors through urban spaces and ensure our strategic habitats remain that with no development!
Continue to support further recycling initiatives, stop cutting refuse collections as it seems to be leading to greater fly tipping and rubbish dumping
Council offices don't seem to care about this issue., surely as a council our offices should be as eco friendly as possible, but this doesn't seem to be thought of.
Regenerating the appallingly run-down parts of the town which create zero civic pride, rather than decimating our greenfield sites.
The homelessness and low income families
Brown field sites to be redeveloped before more loss of green field sites for social housing and low cost home provision. Scrapping the 3rd bedroom tax.
Economic development and construction should have environment in mind. Planning for new housing projects should not progress without much more rigorous carbon management. Rather than developing more holiday let's on the pleasure island site, why not invite the wildlife/ national trust to rewild it - this would also attract people and create jobs. The active travel offer needs to become more ambitious - the current plans for a few additional cycle lanes is a nice start but needs to go much further. The green spaces need to get better - there is no proper park in Scartho (just a couple of fields with dog muck and litter). Look at ways to make homes self sustainable, producing their own on site energy, retrofitting. To take the public with you focus on large businesses and how they can be apart of the salutation for example refineries produce huge amounts of waste heat, before planning is permitted assess if the waste can be used for heating town houses and supplying hot water. Make sure that these types of companies that are also a risk for the community help the community instead of abusing their positions with just pollution that gives children asthma etc. Look at heavy transport planes, ships, lorries and buses before forcing the general public to ditch their cars. Think about how something is used from start to finish for example solar panels and free electricity is a great idea but is it where does the energy to produce the goods come from, is it more expensive than you think, does it solve a problem only to create more problems. If you calculate 1kw of energy cost from solar what is the absolute cost from mining minerals and metals to the energy used to create the panels, what are the real cost and how does it effect the environment ie. Pollution from mining etc. Without doing these detailed calculations you will never know the true cost.

Stop building pointless buildings use the buildings we have that are already empty. Make the change of use for the building easier Such as changing it from Commercial to residential.
Abandon the idea of the western relief road and associated housing as this flies in the face of any notion of the authority being committed to addressing environmental and ecological concerns.
Tackling litter louts and providing more litter bins especially on roads near fast food restaurants. More dog poo bins too and encouraging dog owners to clean up after their pets.
Proactively encourage residents and visitors to be environmentally aware and to take the right actions.

Protecting green spaces and planting wild flowers Encouraging the public to be more proactive in saving energy, recycling and being more environmentally aware
Keeping as many green places as possible
Encourage the community behaviour change to move towards more environmentally sustainable practices
Schemes to encourage households to reduce their water consumption i.e. by encouraging them to adopt water meters. Preserve, protect and expand natural carbon sinks such as the marshes and peatlands which protect against rising sea levels and are more effective at collecting carbon from the atmosphere than trees and forests. Expand the number of EV charging points across the atmosphere and subsidise the costs to refuel to increase uptake from residents and subsidies for charging point contractors to increase more charging points across NEL. Make consideration of the environment and the 'precautionary principle' a key component of the council's decision making, specifically when making procurement decisions and with regards to the regeneration agenda. Sometimes it feels like consideration of the environment is an afterthought when policymakers make decisions. Embed 'life cycle analysis' to procurement and resources management and planning decisions to assess the total environmental impact associated with each stage of a product's life cycle i.e. the environmental degradation associated with mineral extraction or concrete and how durable the product is. Particular emphasis should be given when considering new builds. NELC requires thousands of extra homes by the end of the decade but this comes at a high environmental cost. Careful consideration of the tools, means of construction, components, where the houses are to be built, energy efficiency and length of time before needing repair (new builds are notorious with requiring early repairs once built) must form part of the planning committee's decision-making process on whether to award planning permission or not. Energy from waste produces significant amount of emissions - second only to landfill. Whilst the argument goes that this produces net emissions, if you consider all the emissions produced in NELC as forming a 'carbon budget', EfW still contributes significantly to total emissions produced in this region. If we are serious about being the UK's leading region on renewable energy and on tackling climate change, we need to consider serious alternatives to energy from waste and EfW must be a last resort for waste to go to and with significant safeguards to prevent emissions from escaping the process of turning waste into energy and entering the atmosphere. NELC must use its voice to support green initiatives in the local area, but also act as a critical friend to local businesses and organisations. For example, Humber Zero's project has not been critiqued effectively by either local or national government when public funding was awarded for the scheme. I have challenged them on their assumptions that the north sea gas field has enough space to store carbon captured for 40 years and have asked them for the evidence to support this. Equally, they do not seem to be aware of what CO ₂ will be used for once it is transported across the world as per their model indicating it could simply re-enter the atmosphere somewhere else in the world and defeating the point of the project. They also give an estimated figure of CO ₂ saved by the end of the decade, but have declined to say whether this means their total emissions will actually reduce per year, or in fact, increase. My point here is that if NELC wants to be an effective leader on this subject and act with integrity, they have to look beneath the surface of claims made and challenge businesses to be better and by doing so, delivering strong returns for the people of NELC - in this case, by improving public health and the enjoyment of the local environment. Failure to do so, means that NELC's claims to be a 'climate leader' will feel hollow and actually make it harder for us to achieve our climate goals and be complicit in 'greenwashing' - Humber Zero appears to be a green initiative, but in fact, secures fossil fuels long-term business model in a more

environmentally conscious world via their development of 'blue hydrogen' which requires oil to produce it.

Maintaining and retaining the green areas we have in and around Grimsby and making this an attractive and healthy environment in which to live.

Focus on adding more green areas within built up areas...planting trees, wild flowers and pockets of greenery, encouraging communities to get involved with planting and keeping the use of the allotments we have here . Extensive enhancement of public parks and gardens to encourage birds and wildlife. And to improve people's mental and physical health.

I currently use reusable nappies and majority of councils in the UK offer a voucher or free bundle of re usable nappies to help people to afford and build to their reusable nappies stash , in a month of using reusable nappies I saved 240 disposable ones from going in land fill in north east Lincolnshire

That's just 1 months worth , the more people to use reusable nappies the better

push for more recycling and more charging points for electric vehicles

This is a massive team effort by everyone. Companies (big & small), governments and public (of all walks of life)

I think focusing on environmental wellbeing above all else is the number one priority. So an environmental policy protecting land being built on for profit or plastic being made and used unnecessarily because its cheaper than sustainable material would be a good thing to put in place. Encourage more to work from home in every area possible and encourage more companies to do the same.

Encourage more cycle to work, college & schools. To help ease rush hour traffic.

Have cheaper public transport throughout the country would see cars being used less too. A 3 hour train journey in Australia is \$5! compared to £50 £60 pounds here for the same journey.

Have all public buildings fitted with solar panels.

Also big battery hubs in every borrow for solar panels to charge up & use in throughout the night.

Have companies invest in solar panels and if they manage to get carbon neutral or contribute back to the grid rewarded with tax cuts in other parts of there business.

The heat from our roads could help produce more solar energy (I believe L.A. is experimenting with this.)

Stop building new houses on farmland. instead I suggest with more people working from home. we could use office buildings to turn into flats or knock down office buildings to build new housing estates. This would stop expanding onto green land & give more land to grow more trees, plants, allotments, reed beds on.

Stop cutting down trees in public areas & if you absolutely have too, plant a new one in its place. (Preferably a fruit tree to be harvest for the council to give to those hard up)

I've heard of sewage plants dumping waste into the waterways. More reed beds along the humber, in farmland and waterways would naturally clean our waterways & slow the water down to prevent flooding. It would also stop plastic going out into the ocean. I believe it also traps carbon dioxide too. Win win.

I've also heard about regenerative farming. From what I understand, Instead of plowing the field's releasing loads of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Regenerative farming continuously grows (at least grass) on the land that cattle can graze on, moving the cattle on different parts of the land so the grass can grow. there natural footprint also creates a place for new seeds/crops to be sown. Less carbon dioxide emissions more plants more oxygen.

More marsh lands can take in loads of carbon dioxide too and would be good to see this being implemented somewhere in our borrow if possible.

Stop the production of unnecessary plastic packaging. Increase tax for the big companies that use and produce plastic packaging & reward companies that use biodegradable packaging with a tax cut. This may encourage companies to stop using plastic packaging, which ends up in our oceans, & our oceans contribute most to our oxygen supply.

Check out the ocean clean up, they have developed systems to clean up the Pacific garbage patch. They have similar river systems to help prevent plastic/rubbish heading out into the ocean. Which would be ideal for the humber.

Big changes, big plans and realistic new attitudes like suggested could filter down & change the attitude and mindset of those who litter.

And if we get those who want to help, who are out of work or those who struggle to get work, volunteering to plant more trees, reed beds, clean up the beach days & help set up these initiatives with the council. the more community spirit and pride of our area there will be and a different mindset about where we all live.

I may have gone on a bit there haha. Forgive my spelling. It would be amazing to see a council take the lead instead of waiting and following what others do.

Sustainable energy sources. Reducing energy usage.

Empty house, Tracing owner, rates increase for empty houses, and enforcement not just idle threats, these home have long suffering neighbours.
Do not allow housing development on greenfield sites
Encourage tree planting on new development sites, whether commercial, industrial or urban housing, with a minimum number per development and make the trees protected so that new

owners could not remove them. All new developments should also have to have an area of wildflower planting and a small pond for our amphibian friends. The council could produce data, per street, for example, to show the efficacy of recycling and energy efficiency in that area. No council grass should be cut until after the end of May. This will allow the birds and bees to have ample sustenance during their breeding seasons. All verges should be planted/scattered with seeds and only areas which present a safety risk should be cut, ie edges but not middles of central reservations. The council could also develop a tree planting initiative for the entrance to the town from the A180. This would not only help the environment, it would also help to improve the aesthetics as, at present, driving into the borough via this route is extremely disheartening. Similarly with the A180 Cleethorpes Road and Grimsby Road, if you can't regenerate the delapidated buildings, plant the areas in front of them. We have to be honest here and admit that, particularly Cleethorpes Road, is past its use by date and needs a major effort. The care and planting of these areas could be done by people on community service, instead of them sitting, drinking coffee and pretending to sort charity clothing. Ask the courts to make specific orders for specific offenders. If they do enough, they may find they like it and want to make it their vocation. However, the essential message of all of this is to get more greenery planted to absorb the carbon emissions.

Reduce the need for private motor vehicles

Using public buildings as energy sources or encouraging local business to do this. Often big buildings with large roof areas could be effective sites for solar panels or green energy generation.

Raise awareness about flooding and the real impact on our community.
Eliminate methane emissions from landfill sites. Construct incineration facilities with carbon storage and capture for domestic waste in order to generate electricity. Encourage more to work from home in every area possible and encourage more companies to do the same.

Encourage more cycle to work, college & schools. To help ease rush hour traffic.

Have cheaper public transport throughout the country would see cars being used less too. A 3 hour train journey in Australia is \$5! compared to £50 £60 pounds here for the same journey.

Have all public buildings fitted with solar panels.

Also big battery hubs in every borrow for solar panels to charge up & use in throughout the night.

Have companies invest in solar panels and if they manage to get carbon neutral or contribute back to the grid rewarded with tax cuts in other parts of there business.

The heat from our roads could help produce more solar energy (I believe L.A. is experimenting with this.)

Stop building new houses on farmland. instead I suggest with more people working from home. we could use office buildings to turn into flats or knock down office buildings to build new housing estates. This would stop expanding onto green land & give more land to grow more trees, plants, allotments, reed beds on.

Stop cutting down trees in public areas & if you absolutely have too, plant a new one in its place. (Preferably a fruit tree to be harvest for the council to give to those hard up)

I've heard of sewage plants dumping waste into the waterways. More reed beds along the humber, in farmland and waterways would naturally clean our waterways & slow the water down to prevent flooding. I've also heard about regenerative farming. From what I understand, Instead of plowing the field's releasing loads of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Regenerative farming continuously grows (at least grass) on the land that cattle can graze on, moving the cattle on different parts of the land so the grass can grow. there natural footprint also creates a place for new seeds/crops to be sown. Less carbon dioxide emissions more plants more oxygen.

More marsh lands can take in loads of carbon dioxide too and would be good to see this being implemented somewhere in our borrow if possible.

i have been involved with the planting of many trees over the years and most of them have been vandalised.
There have been many planted but lasted.
Because I dont support this
Plants yes, trees need to be planted but not on pavements, near buildings etc.
Just replace any that are removed
Forests need planting . Single tree planting useless. Less logging
I love trees *REDACTED*
Enough trees in grimsby already
Other measures will be more effective in reducing CO2 than plantsv

You said you didn't support pedestrianisation of more areas. Why is this?
It would use more CO2 to navigate round the areas. The pedestrianised areas we have should be accessible for bikes.
We dont need loads of new building, invest in fixing the broken ones
Lack of passing traffic can be detrimental to some small businesses
The high street is struggling enough and if one area is closed it just routes traffic into a funnel resulting in standing traffic and pollution:
As I like some accessibility in the car, it makes it easier. I use to use the town a lot, but not as much now as I want to be in and out, in the past I may have come into town 3 time a week, now maybe 3 times a year. My money is spent elsewhere now..
It isn't the answer to everything, we need to consider how we move around and like it or not motorised vehicles are here to stay. pedestrianising everywhere simply ends up in having to build more roads to go around the pedestrian zones.
Because when you do it you always get it wrong, look at Seaview Street and the grimsby bus station.

Public transport is insufficient in our area so giving them priority doesn't solve any issues.
People need to get to work and public transport is unreliable

I have mobility issues and need to drive. I can't bike and buses are not an option for me
Cyclists are wholly unregulated and frequently a downright danger to themselves I do support priority to public transport
It is great if you live in a town, but causes problems for people who have to drive into town from the outlying villages. I am OK with public transport, but not bicycles.
You have spent thousands on bicycles lanes and they do not get used properly or the new super high way
Cyclists don't follow Highway Code.
The area is already becoming congested with traffic. Prioritising the others will just lead to more congestion.
Because people aren't ready to listen. All that would happen is that you would do it and cars won't reduce and it will just become hell on earth for everyone.
Because they not controlled very good.
I think there's is enough priority for buses and bikes sometimes people like me need a car to get as close as possible to certain places I have a child with autism we don't qualify for a disability badge but I can't travel by bus with him or be in noisy crowded places for long an example we have to visit freshney place to get him some school shoes from Clark's I can get quite close by parking in the multi storey parking adjoining freshney place we can go directly to Clark's and back to the car it will still be very stressful for him but if we can't even get near to a place we can't go at all which reduces customers going to an already starved top town I just think the whole town needs to be streamlined there's too many traffic lights etc which makes a car journey longer which causes more fumes etc
Cyclists cause difficulties with their inconsiderate behaviour riding two, three abreast on roads. The6 are a nuisance. I don't have a problem with public transport.
Our roads are inadequate for the additional lanes required to achieve this
Traffic build up more fumes. We need better roads into the town from Scartho waltham etc
Cost
All existing forms of diesel engined public transport are increasing, not reducing urban air and noise pollution.
Everyone has a right to travel. Bicycles and buses are not the complete answer. I for one am lethal on a bike wobbling everywhere and I can not possibly get my mum on a bus these day with her wheelchair when only one per bus is allowed. We can not stand all day waiting for a bus to take us.
Public transport, yes, bicycles, no. Goes against having safe walking urbanisation. The bicycles need dedicated cycle routes to keep them from pedestrians and motorists
Cars are a necessary as we live in the country and require a vehicle as pensioners to get anywhere. (no Buses come to village)
A lot of cyclist act irresponsible and are a danger to drivers and pedestrians. Even when a quiet road or cycle Lane some cyclists still insist on being on the pavements. Two on a bike or doing wheelies done the centre of roads is also quite common..
The cycle paths we have are not used. they are a waste of resources.
Cycles mainly, I know they are very Green but most cyclists have no respect for people and other road users as it is.
Lots of people for various reasons are unable to cycle, and on some bus routes the bus service is very poor. which more people want to shop online. which uses more packaging and delivery vehicles.
You have done this..it doesn't get people to use them and takes room away for cars and disabled vehicles.Fir example your thought process at the transport dept is ideological against cars..yet how does our daughter in her wheelchair use a bike..most coaches don't allow wheelchairs on..the buses don't take her as she needs help toileting ect...your dept is clearly anti car by using road

safety as an excuse. For example traffic islands opposite bus stops blocking traffic traffic as the pull up. Or crossings right near roundabouts as at toll bar *REDACTED*
Will cause higher emissions overall due to traffic gridlock - unless tens of millions is invested in local public transport (which won't happen)

Install solar panels on public buildings - eg leisure centres
Cap mileage for council travel and make video calling the norm. Force council workers to robustly justify why they are travelling like a private sector company will
Stop building on green sites and stop greedy landowners from trying to cash in by selling land at premium prices for houses and roads we don't want or need
Encourage electric vehicles by installing more charge points
Cancel the so called western relief road it's a concrete foley there are no congestion in this town to support it by allowing it to go ahead you will be responsible for your own bit of climate change as if the houses then go ahead you're going to be putting a minimum of 3,600 cars on the road that's if every one only has one car do the sums most will have a minimum of two cars 7,200 . Make cycling a more viable option.
Please don't destroy the Freshney valley
Don't know if there are any govt grants to apply for to help homeowners change heating sources and reduce size of windows to become more environmentally friendly. N E Lincs also need to look carefully at flood risk predictions for the next 50 years and as far as possible avoid building in these areas
I oppose the development of new houses and the Grimsby West Relief Road. I feel money will be better spent regenerating the empty properties in Grimsby and focusing our efforts on changing the mindset of our local people. Until they participate then ALL the ideas in this survey will have little to no effect so all they achieve is a waste of our tax money which could be spent in areas that are equally or more important and see something useful instead.

Wildlife preservation
Don't blindly push ahead with pedestrianisation schemes: they usually end up moving the problem rather than solving it. Up the messaging as I think people in general think this is a future issue that we can put on the back burner for now and it isn't - get more facts out there and future implications to not acting now - need champions in directorates that drive this agenda seriously as core business - set some challenges
Offer support and guidance as to how homeowners can install solar panels.
Offer homeowners ability to purchase water butts at discounted rate or provide free
Promote vegan and zero waste lifestyles
Park and Ride. Use the railway to bring visitors into the resort (coaches just clog roads/air same as cars) Boosts employment and flags us up as a serious eco resort.
Look at the factories and see what they can do to be more environmentally friendly. Found out today there is still a fossil fuel plant in Immingham!
Culture changes to support wildlife and reduce carbon emissions - is there anything employees can do to reduce waste at work? Can we turn over areas of parks to wildlife?
You've done a good job with the recycle bins. Keep that up, if you do decide to throw money at helping people with making their homes more energy efficient aim at a range of people on low

incomes not just those on benefits. I will give you an example: My son saved and saved to buy his first house on a salary of £19,000 and it needed a lot of work doing which I helped out with the majority, the council had a scheme running to help people on low income but because my son works, is single and does not claim benefits or live off state handouts he wasn't entitled to anything. End result we didn't do anything to make his house anymore energy efficient than what he and I could afford. Luckily he like my other son has a job outside of NE Lincs so will be moving out of the area. There is very little for the working person to enjoy in this town nowadays which is a shame, I don't think I have known it as bad as this in my 50 years.

Stringently support bio diversity

Allow the installation of wind turbines in industrial areas. Install lots of solar panels to new build and council and industrial buildings.

For years we have complained about lorries coming pass my house when I go for a walk my cloths smell of diesel.

2050 is too late, aim for 2035, better to aim high and fail...by 2040 you should be able to achieve the goals

reduce the amount of contractors that waste public money .

Stop building on green spaces, redevelop the town centre and our suburban derelict spaces

Use windpower on buildings. As an always windy coastal area we have free power if we were to take advantage of it

As mentioned cut the pollution from the refineries.

As we're a resort you need to look more at refuse collection, more information about animals and birdlife on information boards to educate visitors n residents about feeding n caring for our wildlife and also address the omissions from the waste plant off the 180 coming into town, its not very welcoming for a resort!

Stop the building of a completely pointless link road

Be more proactive and be seen to be doing something instead of false promises.
Allowing people to pay carbon neutralising payments which towards the carbon footprint management in the local area. Maybe it's part of the council tax or something, but it should have a status of how carbon neutral you are depending on your travel/energy use and be able to go carbon free and to help the tackling of climate change in the area
Don't build unnecessary roads across the Freshney Valley,
In our area not enough people can afford electric cars. Putting in more charging point might not be effective as not enough people are using them. Looking at fuels will be more effective at this time for this area.
We need more advice on how individual families can make an effort to benefit everyone. News sheets on a regular basis sharing views that enrich the community for little effort.
Maintain seriously cycle ways and pedestrian ways. Encourage people to use these to exercise and use at all times. Spend more on them and have dedicated teams maintaining and keeping them safe to use for the good of the area.
Make more green areas instead of building sites. Councils should be doing all they can to recycle the waste we recycle at home & then half of you don't recycle
Study traffic management in a Dutch town or city to see how cycling has been integrated into main stream transport policy. We are playing at it, going through the motions. With the advent of electric bikes many people would switch to them if it was safe to do so. Traffic and cycles need to be separated.
I have put 'not sure' to 'Give priority to bicycles and public transport over cars in urbanised areas' because that will enrage the drivers (I am a cyclist and car driver) I prefer safe segregated routes for cyclists.

Fine any business or individual for breach of standard. Pitch the policy aggressively to stick in the mind of communities and help engage everyone to do better.
Planning...solar panels with battery storage for all new builds...ensure shop doctors schools are part of large development so journeys are not required to go off the new build estates...look at scartho row after row of new houses yet until Aldi gets built nothing..developers get away with murder

Offer rewards for greener properties or subside costs for any property which wants to be greener. Stop punishing greener gardens for charging to get rid of garden per bin. Create policy to stop trees and green spaces on private properties being removed.
Reduce light pollution
Make public transport more available at night time and weekends. Have a better rail link to ensure residents can access the whole of the country

I understand that covid has made things difficult but the council could find ways to showcase themselves and get buy in from local people on env projects that matter. People like to be involved, you need to harness that.
Replace trees that have died through disease or been blown down. Do not build on greenfield sites. Make existing council buildings and vehicles more energy efficient. Just look at what you have and improve rather than renew. Move away from the 'throwaway' ethos.
Stop the building of unnecessary roads that serve no purpose, that will encourage more cars to emit more pollution into the air, that will push congestion into other pinch points and make matters worse. Do not build a road across the Freshney Valley. It is not a bypass, it is not a relief road, it isn't wanted or needed !!
Encourage homeowners to replace less energy efficient heating by offering incentives or providing a low cost scheme (& not just to people on benefits or low income), and also the same with home insulation. If homes are warmer and heating is more energy efficient then hopefully less of a carbon footprint/ emissions will be created.
Offer better public transport, especially in out lying villages where the only practical option currently is to use a car.

Do not build additional roads in the borough, that would surely increase emissions unnecessarily especially now that the level of traffic on the roads has reduced significantly due to new ways of working during and since covid, I cannot support the use of significant sums of government funding for this eg the Grimsby West relief road, it's not going to relieve anything given the lower level of traffic, use funding to improve the A180 road surface which has been promised since I moved here 33 years ago !

Stop the building of luxury housing.

This is a massive team effort by everyone. Companies (big & small), governments and public (of all walks of life)

I think focusing on environmental wellbeing above all else is the number one priority. So an environmental policy protecting land being built on for profit or plastic being made and used unnecessarily because its cheaper than sustainable material would be a good thing to put in place.

Encourage more to work from home in every area possible and encourage more companies to do the same.

Encourage more cycle to work, college & schools. To help ease rush hour traffic.

Have cheaper public transport throughout the country would see cars being used less too. A 3 hour train journey in Australia is \$5! compared to £50 £60 pounds here for the same journey.

Have all public buildings fitted with solar panels.

Also big battery hubs in every borrow for solar panels to charge up & use in throughout the night.

Have companies invest in solar panels and if they manage to get carbon neutral or contribute back to the grid rewarded with tax cuts in other parts of there business.

The heat from our roads could help produce more solar energy (I believe L.A. is experimenting with this.)

Stop building new houses on farmland. instead I suggest with more people working from home. we could use office buildings to turn into flats or knock down office buildings to build new housing estates. This would stop expanding onto green land & give more land to grow more trees, plants, allotments, reed beds on.

Stop cutting down trees in public areas & if you absolutely have too, plant a new one in its place. (Preferably a fruit tree to be harvest for the council to give to those hard up)

I've heard of sewage plants dumping waste into the waterways. More reed beds along the humber, in farmland and waterways would naturally clean our waterways & slow the water down to prevent flooding. It would also stop plastic going out into the ocean. I believe it also traps carbon dioxide too. Win win.

I've also heard about regenerative farming. From what I understand, Instead of plowing the field's releasing loads of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. Regenerative farming continuously grows (at least grass) on the land that cattle can graze on, moving the cattle on different parts of the land so the grass can grow. there natural footprint also creates a place for new seeds/crops to be sown. Less carbon dioxide emissions more plants more oxygen.

More marsh lands can take in loads of carbon dioxide too and would be good to see this being implemented somewhere in our borrow if possible.

Stop the production of unnecessary plastic packaging. Increase tax for the big companies that use and produce plastic packaging & reward companies that use biodegradable packaging with a tax cut. This may encourage companies to stop using plastic packaging, which ends up in our oceans, & our oceans contribute most to our oxygen supply.

Check out the ocean clean up, they have developed systems to clean up the Pacific garbage patch. They have similar river systems to help prevent plastic/rubbish heading out into the ocean. Which would be ideal for the humber.
