STATEMENT OF ALISON KATE SAXBY

Introduction

- 1. My name is Alison Saxby and I am a Licensing Officer in the Licensing Section of the Humberside Police based at Cromwell Road Police Station, Grimsby. I cover the county of North East Lincolnshire. I am under the direction and control of the Chief Constable of Humberside Police ('the Chief Constable'). My duties include consideration of the impact of crime and disorder and the Chief Constable's response to licensing matters.
- 2. I have been a Licensing Officer since April 2018, prior to which I was a Finance Assistant for 4 years, a Public Service Officer for 2 years and an Anti Social Behaviour Researcher for 2 ½ years. I have worked for Humberside Police for 15 years, and I am familiar with problems of alcohol related crime and disorder in both in my current and previous roles. I hold a BIIAB Alcohol Practitioner qualification.
- HERON FOODS LIMITED, is the applicant for the Premises Licence, applied for under Part 3 of the Licensing Act 2003 ('the Act') in respect of the premises known as Heron Foods, situated at 52-54 Second Avenue, Grimsby, North East Lincolnshire, DN33 1NN.

4. I make this statement in support of the Chief Constable's Objection to the application for a new Premises Licence under Section 18 of the Licensing Act 2003 and is in addition to those papers already served on the authority. The information in this statement is either within my personal knowledge or is taken from files maintained by the Chief Constable.

Background

- 5. The Applicant applied for a New Premises Licence on 16th September 2024, in accordance with Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 6. The premises in question is situated in a retail and residential area, in the area of Nunsthorpe, Grimsby. Other retail premises nearby include takeaways, bakery, barbers and other shops. It is close to the Town Centre. (EXHIBIT AKS/01)
- 7. The premises licence application requests the sale of alcohol Monday to Saturday 0700 to 2100 and Sunday 0800 to 2000.

History

- 8. On 16th September 2024, the police received an application for a new premises licence.
- 9. As part of the application process, consideration is given to several factors to determine what measures need to be put in place to ensure the premises conditions uphold the 4 Licensing Objectives. This includes looking at the area the premises is located, what the issues are in the area and at the premises, any crime concerns and

- anything specific to the area that needs to be addressed. Each application is considered on its own merits.
- 10. Part of the process includes liaising with the local policing team to discuss any concerns with the application or with approving the application, using their local knowledge of the area.
- 11. On this occasion, concern was immediately raised regarding the premises having a licence, with the next concern asking whether there would be security at the shop. It was stated that this had been something that had been requested by Police to staff on multiple occasions over the years, and also that it is a store that is targeted by shoplifters in the area. Concern was raised that this could increase going forward with people targeting the alcohol. (EXHIBIT AKS/02)
- 12. The area has been recognised as a "hot-spot" area under the Government Initiative called Clear Hold Build. This is a multi-agency response that attempts to clear an area of criminality and work to build the community into a more prosperous area. This includes reducing the number of incidents of crime and anti social behaviour in the area to make it a safer place to live and work. As well as Police Involvement, this is being supported by the Council (Community Safety team, Anti-social Behaviour team, Ward Councillors, Public Heath, Environmental Team etc), Fire, Voluntary Action North East Lincolnshire (VANEL), amongst others. (EXHIBIT AKS/03)
- 13. Heron is situated in this area. It is currently the highest crime spot in the locality due to, mainly, shoplifting.
- 14. In the last year, there have been over 50 occurrences of Theft reported to Humberside Police regarding the premises. The majority of these have taken place since April 2024. (EXHIBIT AKS/04)

- 15. During these reports, both staff and customers have challenged the offenders, putting themselves at risk. There have been 3 Assaults reported at the venue since April, one of which was on a customer who tried to stop a theft from happening (08/07/24). On this incident, the suspect threw a basket of chocolate outside the door causing the customer to cut their finger on the door frame. During the scuffle, the suspect fell into the window, causing it to crack. The victim released the suspect, who made off with the goods.
- 16. When the incidents have been reported during the last year, staff have advised police that:
 - They have been intimidated by shoplifters (21/12/23, 14/09/24)
 - Threats have been made to smash windows (07/07/24)
 - They have been threatened that they will be stabbed with a dirty needle (10/09/24) and that if they stop someone from leaving, the suspect will "pin" the staff (11/09/24).
 - Staff have tussled with shoplifters (11/09/24)
 - Threats have been made to burn down a home address (23/09/24)
 - They do not want to provide a statement due to fear of repercussions (01/09/24)
 - They have requested security from Management, as it has worked before, but it has been refused (17/08/24)
- 17. Staff have attempted to shut the doors to prevent shoplifters from leaving the premises, however the offenders have then kicked the window causing it to shatter (17/04/24, 05/05/24)
- Some known shoplifters have been allowed to enter the store on multiple occasions each day without being challenged due to fear of what will happen (05/07/24, 14/09/24 x2)

- 19. The amounts being stolen are quite significant the amounts are usually over £50 each time, with a third of thefts over £100. The main items stolen are large quantities of chocolate or higher value items such as washing/laundry products. On one day, it was said that £400 worth of goods was stolen by 1 person on numerous visits to the store.
- 20. There is concern that once alcohol is in the store, this will be another desirable, high value item that will be targeted. As conditions have been agreed to not sell single cans, there is the potential that cases of beer will be stocked at the premises, which will be attractive to the those that commit crime at the premises due to aiming for multipacks of other items.
- 21. The staff have stated to officers that they have requested from Management that they have security at the premises, which appears to have been trialled a couple of months prior to making this report, where they stated a regular offender caused no issues at the premises during the period. Officers have suggested that they employ someone for security at this time too (17/08/24). (EXHIBIT AKS/05)
- 22. The staff are being put at risk when challenging these individuals and are feeling intimidated and worried about what could happen to them.
- 23. Customers should not have to get involved in stopping those individuals from committing crime, yet that appears to have happened here.
- 24. An SIA trained Security Officer will offer reassurance to staff and customers, and hopefully act as a deterrent to those who are wanting to commit crime at the location. They are trained to deal with

problem behaviour and know the correct techniques to be used in order to prevent or reduce the impact on the store. It will also prevent staff and customers from being placed in situations that they are not trained for, ensuring that they are not assaulted or, alternatively, inadvertently commit a crime.

- 25. During conversations with the Applicants representative, the applicant does not believe the condition is relevant to promote the objectives. Humberside Police believe it is essential for this condition to be in place at all times to uphold the Prevention of Crime and Disorder Licensing Objective.
- 26. They need to be on duty all the time the shop is open as the crimes in the last year has occurred at all different times it would not be responsible to leave a gap where they will be left susceptible to be targeted further.
- 27. This is also required as part of the Hold and Build elements of the Government initiative. Due to Organised Crime groups that have been operating, in order to prevent others forming and children and other vulnerable people being used for CCE, they can be tasked to steal items from shops as an initiation. By having security at the premises, it will be seen as a deterrent and make it harder to target, therefore preventing crime and exploitation.
- 28. If the shop is targeted further for the alcohol it will be selling, it will be detrimental to all the work that has been achieved, and is ongoing, for the foreseeable, in the area to prevent and detect crime.

Submissions

29. The view of the Chief Constable is that, given the level of crime in respect of Heron, the licence be granted only upon the condition

relating to the SIA Security being agreed, along with the other pre agreed conditions (ANNEX 1). This is the only way that the Prevention of Crime and Disorder and other objectives of the Licensing Act 2003 will not be undermined.

30. The Chief Constable requests that the Licensing Committee consider the points made within this statement and asks that they refuse this application if this cannot be agreed.

STATEMENT OF Insp 1377 Claire Jacobs

My name is Claire Jacobs and I am a Neighbourhood Policing Inspector in Humberside police I am based at Cromwell Road police station within Grimsby. I cover the area of The Nunthorpe in North East Lincolnshire and I am responsible for the Clear Hold Build process within the Nunthorpe for Humberside police.

I have been a Police Officer since 2004 and the Neighbourhood Policing Inspector for the areas within Grimsby West since October 2023. I am therefore familiar with problems of alcohol related crime and disorder, and aware of the impact of licensed premises used in criminality and the impact within a community.

The information in this statement is either within my personal knowledge and experience or is taken from files maintained by Humberside police.

I write this statement with the awareness of the 4 Key licensing objectives:

- the prevention of crime and disorder
- public safety
- the prevention of public nuisance
- the protection of children from harm

The Nunsthorpe estate is a renowned area within Grimsby and has suffered endemic anti-social behaviour and increasing criminality perpetrated by a cohort of youths and young adults.

This behaviour has been evident in the locality for generations leading to community acceptance and significant deterioration in service engagement. Offences committed have escalated in severity with an impact on the community, large quantities of class A drugs have been seized from an

organised crime group operating on the estate, with crimes from the same group having included murder and a stabbing incident occurring openly on a busy commercial area.

The estate has been known, locally and nationally, to be of a low social economic standing. This was published in the Grimsby evening telegraph on 06/02/2022

Due to the above the NUNSTHORPE was the first area in NORTH EAST LINCOLNSHIRE to have the CLEAR HOLD BUILD initiative.

The ultimate objective of the Clear Hold Build was to develop sustainable solutions to reduce the number of incidents of reported crime and anti social behaviour within this locality.

This is a long term approach across-partnership working and development of community resilience in order to ensure lasting change.

A Clear Hold Build operation commenced in October 2023 on the Nunsthorpe this is still ongoing with police, Partners and the community.

The Clear Hold Build is an initiative supported by partners such as, Local authority, Local councillors, Youth services, Fire, NHS and adult services.

Details of CLEAR HOLD BUILD operation

CLEAR - ruthlessly pursue Organised crime members through intensive enforcement activity.

HOLD - immediately address the "vacuum" this leaves as part of the Hold phase, by preventing other organised crime groups from taking over the location including by offering support services and safeguarding referrals utilising a cohort of partners

BUILD - strengthen communities' resilience and resistance to criminality in a way that prevents crime and criminal exploitation which leads to serious and organised crime on the estate.

The conditions set by Licensing is to ensure we continue to build resilience within our community and reduce crime in the locality, I am aware of the contended conditions, namely:

- 16. The premises shall ensure there is a minimum of 1 SIA registered door supervision at all times the premises is operating.
- 17. The premise licence holder/DPS/Duty Manager shall ensure that there a risk assessment for the need for extra SIA door supervision at the premises and shall provide door supervision in accordance with that risk assessment. Such an assessment shall be written down and kept at the premises and be available for production on demand by a person under the direction and control of the Chief Constable or an Authorised Officer of North East Lincolnshire Council.

Local staff on the area have recommended and discussed security and designing out crime with the premise on numerous occasions, to mitigate offences and safeguard the location.

From research on police systems there are 56 reported offences at Heron stores Second avenue Grimsby between 01/11/2023- 31/10/2024- one year period.

On 54 reports there is an identified suspect, where individuals have been circulated as wanted, charged and remanded.

In comparison between 01/04/2024-31/10/2024 (this financial year) there has been 32 offences at the location, which is more than the neighbouring stores on Second Avenue, Grimsby combined.

In my experience those that commit shop theft do so:

- As they can not afford the items they are stealing (to use themselves)
- To sell on in order to have money for other items (such as food/ clothing/ drugs/ alcohol)

- To exchange for other items (as above)
- Peer pressure
- Because they are in debt and need to pay of that debt

With the availability of alcohol for sale at a location already identified as a hotspot location for shop theft, this could increase and the availability of unmonitored alcohol use on the estate may increase.

The association between alcohol and violence is well documented. Alcohol consumption and, in particular, binge-drinking increases the risk of being a victim of violence; usually through decreased physical capacity, compromised decision-making and isolation in unsuitable settings.

It also increases the likelihood of perpetrating violence through reduced inhibition and increased aggression.

Discarded bottles and glasses are frequently used as weapons.

Successful community prevention and actions tend to incorporate a range of interventions integrated through and implemented by multi-agency partnerships. Interventions that are relevant in this situation should address:

- improve the design of licensed premises.
- improve licensed premises management: work closely with licensees to implement codes of practice, staff service standards.
- ensure appropriate staff training, including servers and security staff.
- strict enforcement of licensing laws. Safer outside environments:
- targeted policing guided by health service and police data
- use of CCTV
- improve street lighting and enforcement of antisocial regulations.

From the data Heron is a repeat location in relation to Shop theft. Without proper regulation and security at location monitoring and supporting the shop workers there is nothing to deter the criminality at the location. The addition of alcohol being sold at the premise may increase this likelihood and be detrimental to what is seeking to be achieved as part of the Clear Hold Build and also the prevention and detection of crime.

If there is an opportunity to improve the community, prevent offenders and safeguard those that work at the premise and also the wider community I

believe that should be undertaken to promote public safety and the prevention of crime and disorder in the area. Signed: ... Insp 1377 Claire Jacobs Dated:02/11/2024.....

Government announces crackdown against organised criminal gangs

Police to adopt new 'Clear, Hold, Build' tactic, as Home Secretary launches consultation on new offences to frustrate criminal enterprises.

Efforts to clamp down on organised criminal gangs and drive illegal drugs and violent crime from our

communities are being stepped up by the government today.

All police forces across England and Wales will adopt a new approach for tackling serious and organised crime, after early signs of success have been seen by forces already piloting the strategy – with West Yorkshire police reporting a significant drop in burglaries, drug offences and antisocial behaviour in its pilot area.

'Clear, Hold, Build' is a multi-agency partnership tactic, designed by the Home Office and endorsed by the Policing Inspectorate, to rescue areas of the country most blighted by organised crime.

This sees police ruthlessly pursue gang members to clear an area; maintain grip and hold the location, so another gang can't take control in the vacuum; and then work to build the community into a more prosperous area, less susceptible to the draw of crime groups.

The government has also launched a <u>consultation</u> (https://www.gov.uk/government/consultations/strengthening-the-law-enforcement-response-to-serious-and-organised-crime) on potential new laws to criminalise the making, supply and possession of items strongly suspected to facilitate serious crime — such as digital templates for 3D-printing firearms components, pill presses and sophisticated encrypted communication devices.

The consultation will also look at strengthening serious crime prevention orders to make it easier for police and other law enforcement agencies to place restrictions on suspected offenders and stop them from participating in further crime.

Home Secretary, Suella Braverman, said:

- " Enough is enough. We cannot allow depraved criminals to operate under the radar, inciting fear in our communities and profiting from the devastation they cause.
- " Clear, Hold, Build is a common-sense policing approach. Taking out these gangs will prevent violence, stem the flow of harmful

drugs poisoning our communities and cut down on antisocial behaviour. That will, in turn, create a brighter future for young people in those areas.

- "Gun crime in this country is thankfully still rare, but the recent spate of tragic shootings are a stark reminder of what is at stake when gang violence spills onto our streets and I've recently written to affected families to pass on my condolences and deep concern.
- " If stronger laws are also necessary to protect the public, I will not hesitate to act."

Around £2 million will be invested to support the roll-out of 'Clear, Hold, Build' in the highest-harm hot-spot areas in England and Wales to include new organised crime co-ordinators to work with regional organised crime units and forces.

The programme has already been piloted by 7 police forces since 2020 to positive effect, improving community resilience to serious and organised crime but also showing the potential to impact wider crime reduction.

According to Merseyside Police, between August and October last year, the programme yielded a significant increase in operational outcomes in high-harm areas including 420 arrests, 11 firearms and 90 vehicle seizures, and 78 warrants executed.

After 9 year old Olivia Pratt-Korbel was killed last year, the Home Office provided Merseyside Police with £350,000 to expand the roll-out of 'Clear, Hold, Build' which was already being trialled in the region, to more hot-spot sites.

There were also several crime reductions within the pilot site in West Yorkshire including a 57% reduction in burglary, 27% reduction in drug offences and 38% reduction in antisocial behaviour.

On 'Clear, Hold, Build', National Police Chiefs' Council Lead for Serious and Organised Crime, Chief Constable Steve Jupp, said:

- " The rollout of Clear, Hold, Build across policing is an important step in tackling and preventing serious and organised crime.
- "This approach will see police forces and regional organised crime units (ROCUs) work more closely with local partners to build resilience in communities and prevent those at risk from being drawn into crime.
- "The support for this system-wide approach, alongside significant investment into ROCUs, has enabled us to maximise our efforts and effectiveness against high-harm offenders alongside our law enforcement partners. Extending and maintaining this support across the country will help to ensure a strong response across the entirety of policing."

Under the consultation published today, the government is considering new ways to strengthen the law enforcement agencies response to serious and organised crime and ability to frustrate criminal operations. The public will be asked to review 2 new legislative measures which would:

- create a new offence which criminalises the making, modification, supply, offer to supply and possession of articles where there is strong suspicion they are being use for serious crime, such as:
 - sophisticated and bespoke encrypted communication devices used to facilitate organised crime
 - vehicle concealments used to conceal and transport illicit goods
 - digital templates that can be used for 3Dprinted firearm components
 - · pill presses used in the supply of illegal drugs
- strengthen the functioning of serious crime prevention orders by:
 - expanding the list of enforcement agencies that can apply for an order in the absence of a conviction to include police forces (currently only able to do so in terrorism-related cases),

the National Crime Agency and British Transport Police

- enabling the Crown Court to grant an order on acquittal, where this may still be appropriate for the protection of the public
- improving the ongoing monitoring and enforcement of the orders to enable closer management of those known to have been involved in serious crime

National Crime Agency (NCA) Director General, Graeme Biggar, said:

- " Serious and organised crime is a corrosive threat to the UK's people and economy.
- "The NCA works relentlessly to protect the public from the most harmful criminals, but as the challenge posed by our adversaries grows and evolves, the UK's response must also advance.
- "It is vital that we can disrupt the criminals seeking to use specialist technology and other customised products to manufacture and conceal drugs and firearms, share child abuse images or plan people smuggling activity.
- " UK law enforcement bodies must also be able to use the full range of legislative tools to prevent serious and organised crime, and deter the perpetrators.
- "The NCA welcomes this consultation, and encourages our partners to contribute their views."

Today's announcements are part of a wider body of ongoing work to tackle serious and organised crime. The government plans to publish a new strategy later this year to update the Serious and Organised Crime Strategy published in 2018.



Proposed Conditions - Heron

(Highlighted in Red are not agreed, all others are agreed)

- 1. A Suitable close circuit television system will be installed and operational at the premises at all times when licensable activities are being carried out and at any other times where members of the public are present on the premises, with warning signs displayed in public areas of the premises.
- 2. The CCTV system will be of satisfactory resolution quality which will enable the identification of persons and activities.
- 3. The CCTV system will have sufficient storage, retention and capacity for a minimum of 28 days continuous footage which will be recording in colour, providing real time pictures of evidential quality in all lighting conditions
- 4. There will be sufficient cameras to cover those areas that are not easily supervised from the sales counter.
- 5. Cameras must be positioned to view all access to and egress from the premises (including fire exits) and all areas where the sale of alcohol occurs.
- 6. Any system installed should be capable of producing copies of recordings on site.
- 7. A designated member of staff will be authorised to access the CCTV footage and be conversant with operating the CCTV system at all times the premises is operating. At the request of an authorised officer of the licensing authority or a responsible authority, any CCTV footage as requested will be downloaded immediately or secured to prevent any overwriting. The CCTV footage material will be supplied on request to an authorised officer of the licensing authority or a responsible authority.
- 8. Records of maintenance of the CCTV system shall be kept by the person responsible and the system shall be maintained in working order and checked weekly. Records of any maintenance/weekly checks shall be endorsed by signature by the DPS or other responsible named individual, and actions taken must be recorded. The record shall be produced on request to a person under the direction and control of the Chief Constable or an officer of the local authority on production of their identification.
- 9. Recordings must be made of each trading period conducted at the premises, and must be correctly time and date marked.
- 10. CCTV camera views are not to be obstructed.
- 11. An incident report register/log book shall be kept at the premises, and made available on request to a person under the direction and control of the Chief Constable or an officer of North East Lincolnshire Council, which will record the following:
 - o all crimes reported to the venue
 - all ejections of patrons
 - any complaints received
 - any incidents of disorder/ASB
 - o all seizures of drugs or offensive weapons

o any visit by a relevant authority or emergency service

The incident report register will be produced for inspection immediately on the request of an authorised officer.

- 12. A refusal register will be placed on each till area, and staff trained how to use this. It will record:
 - o The time and date of the refusal
 - Details/description of the person attempting to purchase
 - o Identity of the staff member refusing the sale

The registers will be made available for inspection by a person under the direction and control of the Chief Constable or an officer of North East Lincolnshire Council.

- 13. Staff training will be given to all staff working at the premises by the DPS. Such training shall be documented and recorded in a book/folder kept solely for that purpose. It will record the date and names of those trained and the person providing it. All present shall sign the book. The frequency of the training shall be upon commencement of employment, with refresher training once every six months. The training shall cover all aspects of the responsible sale of alcohol (Premises Licence Conditions, Licensing objectives, age verification, how to detect proxy sales, consequences of underage sales, serving to a person who is drunk and street drinkers etc) and conflict management. The book will be available to be viewed on demand by a person under the direction and control of the Chief Constable or an officer of North East Lincolnshire Council.
- 14. Notices shall be displayed at the exit requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly.
- 15. Challenge 25 shall be implemented and a proof of age policy is to be applied with the accepted means of proof of age being:
 - Passport
 - Photo Driving Licence
 - A recognised valid photo-id card bearing the PASS hologram
 - o any future accredited and accepted proof of age, as defined by Humberside Police Signs shall be displayed stating that the premises operates a Challenge 25 Policy.
- 16. The premises shall ensure there is a minimum of 1 SIA registered door supervision at all times the premises is operating.
- The premise iscence holder/DPS/Duty Manager shall ensure that there a risk assessment for the need for extra SIA door supervision at the premises and shall provide door supervision in accordance with that risk assessment. Such an assessment shall be written down and apprain the premises and be available for production on demand by a person under the direction and control of the Chief Constable or an Authorised Officer of North East Lincolnshine Council.
- 18. The premise will not display, offer, or sell any beers, lagers, ciders or pre-mixed spirit drink with an ABV in excess of 5.6%.

- All beer, lager and cider displayed for sale in cans will only be sold in minimum packs of 4 cans, there will be no sales of individual cans of beer, lager or cider.
- 19. Alcohol spirits with an ABV (Alcohol by volume) above 20% will only be displayed, offered or sold in bottles no less than 70cl. These spirits will only be displayed for sale behind the sales counter or other Police approved secure display.
