Executive Summary

Executive summary

Scope

We have been engaged to audit the financial statements of North East Lincolnshire Council for the year ended 31 March 2025 which are prepared in accordance with the 2024/25 Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting.

We have conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) ('ISAs'), relevant ethical and professional standards, and the terms of our engagement communicated in our engagement letter.

Audit status

Our audit procedures are now substantially complete for the year ended 31 March 2025.

Please refer to the 'Status of our audit' section for a list of significant audit matters outstanding at the date of this report. We will provide an update to the Audit and Governance Committee on completion of those outstanding matters by way of a follow-up letter.

Areas of focus and audit approach, and significant findings

We have not made any changes to our initial risk assessment and planned audit approach that was communicated to the Audit and Governance Committee in our Audit Strategy Memorandum.

Our significant risks and other areas of focus are set out in the 'Audit approach and risk summary' section, with a summary of our audit approach over those areas. Significant findings from our audit are set out in the 'Significant findings' section.

Significant control deficiencies

We did not identify any significant deficiencies in internal control.

Audit misstatements

A summary of the adjusted and unadjusted misstatements above our reporting threshold we have identified to date is set out in the 'Summary of misstatements' section.

Audit opinion

At the time of issuing this report and subject to the satisfactory conclusion of our remaining audit work, we anticipate issuing an unqualified opinion, without modification, as set out in Appendix C.

Value for Money

We have completed our work, but we will continue to assess arrangements up to the point of reporting which is planned by the end of November 2025.

We anticipate having no significant weaknesses in arrangements to report in relation to the arrangements that the Council has in place to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources.

In recent years a significant weakness has been reported in relation to OFSTED's judgement of Inadequate reported in 2021 on children's services. We are pleased to report that OFSTED's recent reassessment of children's services as Good overall has resulted in the removal of the significant weakness that has been previously reported. Further details have been provided in the 'Value for Money' section of this report.

Wider reporting powers

The 2014 Act requires us to give an elector, or any representative of the elector, the opportunity to question us about the accounting records of the Council and to consider any objection made to the accounts. We did not receive any questions or objections from local electors.

Reporting to the group auditor

We have not yet received group instructions from the National Audit Office in respect of our work on the Council's WGA submission. We are unable to commence our work in this area until such instructions have been received.



Executive summary

Qualitative aspects of Council's accounting practices

We have reviewed the Council's accounting policies and disclosures and conclude that they comply with the 2024/25 Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting, appropriately tailored to the Council's circumstances.

Draft accounts were received from the Council on 30 June 2025 and were of a good quality. The working papers supporting the financial statements were also of good quality and were comprehensive.

Significant matters discussed with management

During our audit, we discussed the following significant matters with management:

- The Council's financial position, including development of the medium-term financial plan: During the year, we have met with officers to discuss the Council's financial position and budget setting process and pressures to enable us to reflect on the Council's financial resilience and sustainability, and to conclude whether the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate;
- · Ongoing challenges in Children's services and how the Council has addressed them;
- · Updates in relation to local government devolution; and
- Discussion of the contract in relation to the Corporation Bridge works.

Significant difficulties during the audit

We have not encountered any significant difficulties and we have had the full co-operation of management.

Other matters of significance

We encountered no significant difficulties during our audit and had no significant disagreements with management. There was effective co-operation and communication between Forvis Mazars, management, and Audit and Governance Committee during our audit. All requested information and explanations were provided to us.

Audit approach and risk summary

Changes to our audit approach

There have been no changes to the audit approach we communicated in our Audit Strategy Memorandum, issued on 29 April 2025.

Materiality

Our provisional materiality at the planning stage of our audit was set at £7.375m using a benchmark of 2% of gross operating expenditure as per the Audit Strategy Memorandum.

Based on the final financial statement figures and other qualitative factors, the final overall materiality we applied was £8.395m (final performance materiality: £6.716m; final clearly trivial threshold: £252k).

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Significant findings

The significant findings from our audit include our conclusions regarding the significant risks we identified and other key areas of judgement, which are set out in this section.

Significant risks

Management override of controls

Description of the risk

This is a mandatory significant risk on all audits due to the unpredictable way in which such override could occur.

Management at various levels within an organisation are in a unique position to perpetrate fraud because of their ability to manipulate accounting records and prepare fraudulent financial statements by overriding controls that otherwise appear to be operating effectively. Due to the unpredictable way in which such override could occur there is a risk of material misstatement due to fraud on all audits.

How we addressed this risk

We addressed this risk through performing audit work over:

- Accounting estimates impacting amounts included in the financial statements;
- · Consideration of identified significant transactions outside the normal course of business; and
- Journal entries recorded in the general ledger and other adjustments made in preparation of the financial statements.

Audit conclusion

At the date of this report, we have not identified any significant issues to report.

ISA 240 in relation to fraud identifies a presumed risk of fraud in revenue recognition, but allows for this to be rebutted. We have rebutted the presumed risk on the grounds that the culture and ethical framework and the systems of internal control mean that the opportunities to manipulate the recognition of revenue at the Council are limited, and based on our assessment of the current financial position there is little incentive to do so. We still test of the cut-off of revenue before and after the year end to ensure that revenue is recognised in the correct financial year, but we have not elevated this to a significant risk.



Significant risks (continued)

Valuation of the LGPS net Description of the risk defined pension liability

The Council is an employer in the Local Government Pension Scheme, administered on a local level by the East Riding Pension Fund.

The defined benefit assets and liabilities are significant items in the Council's balance sheet and the Council engages an actuary to perform an annual valuation in accordance with the requirements of IAS 19 Employee Benefits. Due to the high degree of estimation uncertainty associated with this valuation, we have identified a significant risk in this area.

How we addressed this risk

We addressed this risk by:

- Critically assessing the competency, objectivity and independence of the East Riding Pension Fund's Actuary;
- · Liaising with the auditors of the East Riding Pension Fund to gain assurance over the design and implementation of the controls in place at the Pension Fund. This included the processes and controls in place to ensure data provided to the Actuary by the Pension Fund for the purposes of the IAS19 valuation is complete and accurate;
- Reviewing the appropriateness of the pension asset and liability valuation methodologies applied by the Pension Fund Actuary, and the key assumptions included within the valuation. This included comparing them to expected ranges, utilising information from PwC the consulting actuary engaged by the National Audit Office; and
- Agreeing the data in the IAS 19 valuation report provided by the Fund Actuary for accounting purposes to the pension accounting entries disclosures in the Council's financial statements. As there was a pension surplus arising in 2024/25, we considered the accounting treatment required under IFRIC 14.

Audit conclusion

At the date of this report, we have not identified any significant issues to report.

We are still waiting a pension fund assurance letter from the auditor of the East Riding Pension Fund.



Significant risks (continued)

Valuation of land and buildings, surplus assets and investment properties

Description of the risk

Land and buildings within Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE), surplus assets and investment properties are significant items on the Council's balance sheet.

The valuation of land and buildings, surplus assets and investment properties is complex and involves a number of management assumptions and judgements. Due to the high degree of estimation uncertainty involved, we have identified a significant risk in this area.

How we addressed this risk

We addressed this risk by:

- · Critically assessing the Council's valuer's scope of work, qualifications, objectivity and independence to carry out the required programme of revaluations;
- Considering whether the overall revaluation methodologies used by the Council's valuers were in line with industry practice, the CIPFA Code of Practice and the Council's accounting policies; and
- Critically assessing the approach that the Council adopted to ensure that assets not subject to revaluation in 2024/25 are materially correct, including considering the robustness of that approach in light of the valuation information reported by the Council's valuers.

Audit conclusion

At the date of this report, we have not identified any significant issues to report.



Other key areas of management judgement / enhanced risks

Revenue Expenditure Funded from Capital Under Statute (REFCUS)

Description of the risk

The Council, as with all English councils, are facing spending pressures in social services. The situation is heightened at the Council because of its previous poor inspection and subsequent intervention in children's services.

The Council recognises the need to make transformative change in order to address the underlying issues in the service and as a result are considering how and whether to flexibly use capital receipts.

This has led to an enhanced risk to ensure that regulations are followed and REFCUS is accounted for appropriately.

How we addressed this risk

We reviewed the Council's arrangements to comply with relevant guidance on the use of flexible capital receipts, including governance and reporting.

We also tested expenditure applied under the flexible capital receipts policy to ensure they met relevant definitions and were recoded accurately.

Audit conclusion

At the date of this report, we have not identified any significant issues to report. As noted on page 8 of this report, we have not yet completed our work in this area.



Wider responsibilities

Our powers and responsibilities under the 2014 Act are broad and include the ability to:

- · issue a report in the public interest;
- · make statutory recommendations that must be considered and responded to publicly;
- apply to the court for a declaration that an item of account is contrary to law; and
- issue an advisory notice under schedule 8 of the 2014 Act.

We have not exercised any of these powers as part of our 2024/25 audit.

The 2014 Act also gives rights to local electors and other parties, such as the right to ask questions of the auditor and the right to make an objection to an item of account. We did not receive any questions or objections from local electors.



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Internal control conclusions

Significant control deficiencies

As part of our audit, we obtained an understanding of the Council's internal control environment and control activities relevant to the preparation of the financial statements, which was sufficient to plan our audit and determine the nature, timing, and extent of our audit procedures. Although our audit was not designed to express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal controls, we are required to communicate to the Audit and Governance Committee any significant deficiencies in internal controls that we identified in during our audit.

Deficiencies in internal control

A deficiency in internal control exists if:

- A control is designed, implemented, or operated in such a way that it is unable to prevent, detect, and/ or correct potential misstatements in the financial statements; or
- A control that is necessary to prevent, detect, and/ or correct misstatements in the financial statements on a timely basis is missing.

The purpose of our audit was to express an opinion on the financial statements. As part of our audit, we have considered the Council's internal controls relevant to the preparation of the financial statements to design audit procedures to allow us to express an opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal controls or to identify any significant deficiencies in their design or operation.

The matters reported in this section of our report are limited to those deficiencies and other control recommendations that we have identified during our normal audit procedures and which we consider to be of sufficient importance to merit being reported.

If we had performed more extensive procedures on internal control, we might have identified more deficiencies to report or concluded that some of the reported deficiencies need not in fact have been reported.

Our comments in this section should not be regarded as a comprehensive record of all deficiencies that may exist or improvements that could be made.

Significant deficiencies in internal control

A significant deficiency in internal control is one which, in our professional judgement, has the potential for financial loss, damage to reputation, or a loss of information which may have implications on the achievement of business strategic objectives. Our view is that observations categorised as a significant deficiency is of sufficient importance to merit the attention of the Audit and Governance Committee.

We have not identified any significant deficiencies in the Council's internal controls as at the date of this report.

Other observations

We also record our observations on the Council's internal controls where, in our professional judgement, there is a need to strengthen internal control or enhance business efficiency that do not constitute significant deficiencies in internal control but which we view as being important for consideration by management.

We have identified one other deficiency in the Council's internal controls as at the date of this report. This is considered in Appendix A.

We have followed up on the two internal control recommendations highlighted in the prior year audit. These are considered in Appendix A. There are no residual matters relating to the prior year recommendations.



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Summary of misstatements

Summary of misstatements

Unadjusted misstatements

Our overall materiality, performance materiality, and clearly trivial (reporting) threshold were reported in our Audit Strategy Memorandum, issued on 29 April 2025. Any subsequent changes to those figures are set out in the 'Audit approach and risk summary' section of this report.

We identified no misstatements above our reporting threshold, or that we deem to be material by nature, as at the date of this report which were not adjusted.

Adjusted misstatements

We identified no misstatements above our reporting threshold, or that we deem to be material by nature, that as at the date of this report required adjustment..



Summary of misstatements

Disclosure misstatements

We have not identified any disclosure misstatements as at the date of this report.

Management has made a number of amendments to the draft financial statements published on 30 June 2025. These were to correct minor errors identified or to provide further information that had arisen after the date that the accounts were published: In our view, this highlights the Council's ownership of its financial statements and its wish to make them as up-to-date and informative as possible.

The changes are summarised below:

- · Amendments to the capital commitments disclosed in Note 14, Property, Plant and Equipment;
- Amendments to the Operating Leases disclosed in Note 37, Leases;
- An update to the Contingent Liabilities disclosed in Note 40, in respect of the Equans Contract Final Account Negotiation and the Contractual Dispute with a Contractor in relation to works on Corporation Bridge; and
- · Other minor clarifications.



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Fraud considerations

Fraud considerations

We have a responsibility to plan and perform our audit to obtain reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Your responsibilities


Management has primary responsibility for the prevention and detection of fraud. It is important that management, with Audit and Governance Committee oversight, place a strong emphasis on fraud prevention, which may reduce opportunities for fraud to take place, and fraud deterrence, which could persuade individuals not to commit fraud because of the likelihood of detection and punishment. This involves a commitment to creating a culture of honesty and ethical behaviour which is reinforced by Audit and Governance Committee's active oversight.

Our responsibilities

We have a responsibility for obtaining reasonable assurance that the financial statements taken as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. The distinguishing factor between fraud and error is whether the underlying action that results in a misstatement is intentional or unintentional. Two types of intentional misstatements are relevant to us — misstatements resulting from fraudulent financial reporting, and misstatements resulting from the misappropriation of assets.

ISA presumed fraud risks

As set out in the 'Audit approach and risk summary' section, the risks of fraud as a result of management override of controls was identified as a significant risk.



We did not identify any actual or suspected fraud involving management, employees with significant roles in internal control or others, where the fraud resulted in a material misstatement in the financial statements.

Value for Money

Value for Money

Approach to Value for Money

We are required to form a view as to whether the Council has made proper arrangements for securing economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources. The NAO issues guidance to auditors that underpins the work we are required to carry out in order to form our view and sets out the overall criterion and sub-criteria that we are required to consider.

This is the first audit year where we have undertaken our value for money (VFM) work under the full 2024 Code of Audit Practice (the Code). Our responsibility remains to be satisfied that the Council has proper arrangements in place, and to report in the auditor's report where we are not satisfied that arrangements are in place. Where we have issued a recommendation in relation to a significant weaknesses this indicates we are not satisfied that arrangements are in place. Separately we provide a commentary on the Council's arrangements in the Auditor's Annual Report.

A key change in the 2024 Code of Audit Practice is the requirement for us to issue our Auditor's Annual Report for the year ending 31st March 2025 to you in draft by the 30th November 2025. This is required whether our audit is complete or not. Should our work not be complete, we will report the status of our work and any findings to up to that point (and since the issue of our previous Auditor's Annual Report).

The Code requires us to structure our commentary to report under three specified criteria:

- Financial sustainability How the Council plans and manages its resources to ensure it can continue to deliver its services;
- **Governance** How the Council ensures that it makes informed decisions and properly manages its risks; and
- Improving economy, efficiency and effectiveness How the Council uses information about its
 costs and performance to improve the way it manages and delivers its services.

At the planning stage of the audit, we undertake work to understand the arrangements that the Council has in place under each of the reporting criteria and we identify risks of significant weaknesses in those arrangements. Although we describe this work as planning work, we keep our understanding of arrangements under review and update our risk assessment throughout the audit to reflect emerging issues that may suggest significant weaknesses in arrangements exist.

In our Audit Strategy Memorandum issued on 29 April 2025, we identified the risk of a significant weakness in arrangements relating to OFSTED's assessment of children's services as Inadequate in 2021.

Where our risk-based procedures identify actual significant weaknesses in arrangements we are required to report these and make recommendations for improvement. Where such significant weaknesses are identified, we report these in the audit report by exception. We will also highlight emerging issues or other matters that do not represent significant weaknesses but still require attention from the Council.

The primary output of our work on the Council's arrangements is the commentary on those arrangements that forms part of the Auditor's Annual Report. This commentary will provide a summary of the work we have undertaken and our judgements against each of the specified reporting criteria. We intend to issue the Auditor's Annual Report in by the end of November 2025.

Status of our work

We have completed our work, but we will continue to assess arrangements up to the point of reporting which is planned by the end of November 2025.

We anticipate having no significant weaknesses in arrangements to report in relation to the arrangements that the Council has in place to secure economy, efficiency and effectiveness in its use of resources.

In recent years a significant weakness has been reported in relation to OFSTED's judgement of Inadequate reported in 2021 on children's services. We are pleased to report that OFSTED's recent reassessment of children's services as Good overall has resulted in the removal of the significant weakness that has been previously reported. Our consideration of this is set out in more detail on the next page.

We have completed our work in respect of the Council's arrangements for the year ended 31 March 2025 and we have not identified any significant weaknesses in arrangements that have required us to make a recommendation. Our draft audit report at Appendix C confirms that we have no matters to report in respect of significant weaknesses. As noted above, our commentary on the Council's arrangements will be provided in the Auditor's Annual Report planned to be issued by the end of November 2025



Value for Money

Follow up of previously-reported significant weaknesses in arrangements

In recent years we reported a significant weakness to the Council. As part of our work in 2024/25, we followed up the progress made by the Council against the recommendations made and determined whether the significant weakness remained during the year. We concluded that this significant weakness could be removed and does not apply to the 2024/25 financial year, as explained in the table below.

Children's Services Ofsted is the Office for Standards in Education, Children's Services and Skills. It inspects and regulates services that care for children and young people. The Authority's children's services were last inspected in 2017, when it was rated "Good". Ofsted has carried out focused visits in the intervening period with the most recent letter being dated in June 2021, but without changing the overall rating. In October 2021, Ofsted commenced an inspection into children's services, publishing its report on 26 November 2021. The overall effectiveness of children's services has been graded "Inadequate", citing weaknesses in assessment, planning and decision-making. The matters identified by Ofsted are relevant to the financial year ending 31 March 2021 and, in our view, indicate a significant weakness in the Authority's arrangements for Governance (how the body ensures that it makes informed decisions and properly manages its risks) and for Improving Economy, Efficiency and Effectiveness (how the body uses information about its costs and performance to improve the way it manages and delivers its services) reporting. Recommendation In order to ensure systems, processes and training are in place to manage the risks relating to the safety and welfare of service users, the Authority must ensure it embeds and sustains the action plans that it has put in place to address the issues identified by Ofsted. In July 2025 OFSTED completed an Inspection of North East Lincolnshire's local authority children's services, and has now reported its findings. This is a considerable achievement for the Council and reflects the diligent work that has been done to improve this important service. As part of our audit, we have considered the Council's internal controls relevant to the preparation of the financial statements to design audit procedures to allow us to express an opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Council's internal controls or to identify any significant deficiencies in their design or operation.

The matters reported in Appendix A are limited to those deficiencies and other control recommendations that we have identified during our normal audit procedures and which we consider to be of sufficient importance to merit being reported. If we had performed more extensive procedures on internal control, we might have identified more deficiencies to report or concluded that some of the reported deficiencies need not in fact have been reported. Our comments in Appendix A should not be regarded as a comprehensive record of all deficiencies that may exist or improvements that could be made.

We identified one other deficiency in the Council's internal controls as at the date of this report, and this is set out on page on the next page of this report.

We have followed up on the two internal control recommendations highlighted in the prior year audit, and this is set out on page 30. There are no residual matters relating to the prior year recommendations.



Appendix A: Internal control conclusions

Other observations – other deficiencies in internal control

We set out below the one other deficiency in the Council's internal controls identifies as at the date of this report.

IT General Controls (ITGC)

Description of deficiency

We found no evidence to suggest that the following was documented in the Security Policy:

Limited use of non-nominative accounts.

Regarding changes to Unit 4 we have found no evidence to suggest that the following is documented by North East Lincolnshire Council or North Lincolnshire Council who oversee Unit 4 in relation to Change Management:

- Description of process regarding changes to Unit 4 (normal or emergency changes or major updates);
- Roles and responsibilities of individuals regarding this;
- Recording centrally of changes made to the system;
- Approval of changes to Unit 4, testing of changes, approval of transfer to production and segregation between testing environment and actual environment;
- · Requirement to carry out unitary/module testing, non-regression testing and user acceptance testing; and
- Requirement to check accounts on a periodic basis to ensure accounts are still valid and individuals only have the access required for their roles.

Potential effects

An absence of written policies could result in inconsistent practices and / or errors in processing.

Recommendation

The Council should consider updating its Security Policy to cover and minimise use of non-nominative accounts and ensure written policies and procedures are in place to ensure that Unit 4's Change Management processes are complete and fully documented.



Appendix A: Internal control conclusions

Follow up on previous internal control points

We set out below an update on internal control points raised in prior periods.

Asset disposals

Description of deficiency

In our testing of asset disposals, we identified that there were several items disposed of in 2022/23 but not identified until 2023/24.

Current year update:

There has been no recurrence of this issue during 2024/25 audit testing.

Potential effects

Risk of material error in the financial statements.

Recommendation from last year

The Council needs to improve procedures for the timely identification and recording of asset disposals.

Application of £10k de minimis for accruals

Description of deficiency

In our testing of income and expenditure, we identified some items over the Council's own £10,000 de-minimis policy that had been recoded in the incorrect period. These mainly involved items where the services covered more than one financial period.

Current year update:

There has been no recurrence of this issue during 2024/25 audit testing.

Potential effects

Risk of recoding income and expenditure in the incorrect financial period.

Recommendation from last year

The Council should reevaluate and update its considerations of de-minimis levels for recording income and expenditure by financial period and remind finance team members of the need to calculate accruals and prepayments where services span more than one financial year.

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion on the financial statements

We have audited the financial statements of North East Lincolnshire Council ('the Council') for the year ended 31 March 2025, which comprise the Comprehensive Income and Expenditure Statement, the Movement in Reserves Statement, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement, Collection Fund and notes to the financial statements, including material accounting policy information.

The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and the CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2024/25.

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the financial position of the Council as at 31st March 2025 and of its expenditure and income for the year then ended; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with the CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2024/25.

Basis for opinion

Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

- · inspecting correspondence, if any, with relevant licensing or regulatory authorities;
- reviewing relevant meeting minutes in the year;
- · communicating identified laws and regulations throughout our engagement team and remaining alert to any indications of non-compliance throughout our audit; and
- · considering the risk of acts by the Council which were contrary to applicable laws and regulations, including fraud.

We also considered those laws and regulations that have a direct effect on the preparation of the financial statements, such as the Local Government Act 2003 (and associated regulations made under section 21), the Local Government Finance Acts of 1988, 1992 and 2012, and the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015.

In addition, we evaluated management's incentives and opportunities for fraudulent manipulation of the financial statements (including the risk of override of controls) and determined that the principal risks were related to posting manual journal entries to manipulate financial performance, management bias through judgements and assumptions in significant accounting estimates, in particular in relation to land and buildings valuations and pension disclosures, revenue recognition, and significant one-off or unusual transactions.

Our audit procedures in relation to fraud included but were not limited to:

- making enquiries of management, Internal Audit and the Audit and Governance Committee on whether they had knowledge of any actual, suspected or alleged fraud;
- gaining an understanding of the internal controls established to mitigate risks related to fraud;
- · discussing amongst the engagement team the risks of fraud; and
- · addressing the risks of fraud through management override of controls by performing journal entry testing.

There are inherent limitations in the audit procedures described above and the primary responsibility for the prevention and detection of irregularities including fraud, rests with both management and the Audit and Governance Committee.
