





Addendum to our initial objections per paragraph.

Paragraph C)

The amendment to the siting of the cycle shed will decrease security of our garden & property, as access will be less secure than it is at present.

Paragraph D)

Although the developers have verbally stated there will be a rigorous vetting of all prospective clients. As previously mentioned, other HMO's in the vicinity are under subscribed therefore there is very likely to be "price-crumbling", due to oversupply market force's applying.

Given the investment in the property, in order to maintain a high level of occupancy that will inevitably lead to slippage in the vetting regime.

Paragraph F)

Half of the rooms resemble prison accommodation (without the wardens to keep order) plus a shared kitchen for nine (or more, with sundry 'guests') adding to the possibility of tenant disputes & noise.

I noted there had been what I assume was a noise assessment done from the interior of the building. Excess noise & disruptive behaviour are precisely our major objections to the proposed HMO. Eight windows open in warm weather (approximately five/six metres from our bedroom) broadcasting & amplifying each individual room's internal noises, especially at night, would be a major imposition to our quality of life.
