# Do you pay full price for your children to attend a breakfast, after school or holiday club?

You can use your tax-free allowance at Ofsted-registered providers

## What is Tax-Free Childcare?

Tax-Free Childcare supports working parents with childcare costs. For every £8 you pay in, the government will pay in an extra £2. You can get up to £2,000 per child per year, or £4,000 for disabled children.

You can use Tax-Free Childcare to pay for:

- Childminders
- Nurseries and nannies
- Breakfast, after school and holiday clubs
- Playschemes
- Home care workers working for a registered home care agency

## Louise & Dave's Story

Louise and Dave have always embraced family life and new challenges. For Louise, fostering had been a lifelong idea, but it became real one evening when Dave turned to her and said, "I want to foster." From that moment, they knew they were ready.

Their first child came unexpectedly: a five-year-old boy arriving late at night, frightened and carrying his belongings in a single bag. "All I could think was he doesn't know us, and he needs to feel safe," Louise recalls.

That first night was about small acts of care... a bath, clean pyjamas, and reassurance. "He held onto his teddy so tightly. It meant everything to him."

Over time, they watched him grow in confidence and ability. "The progress was incredible," says Louise. "Seeing him happy, learning and trusting again made it all worthwhile."

"It's not always easy," they add, "but you're supported, and you make a real difference. If you care, you can foster."

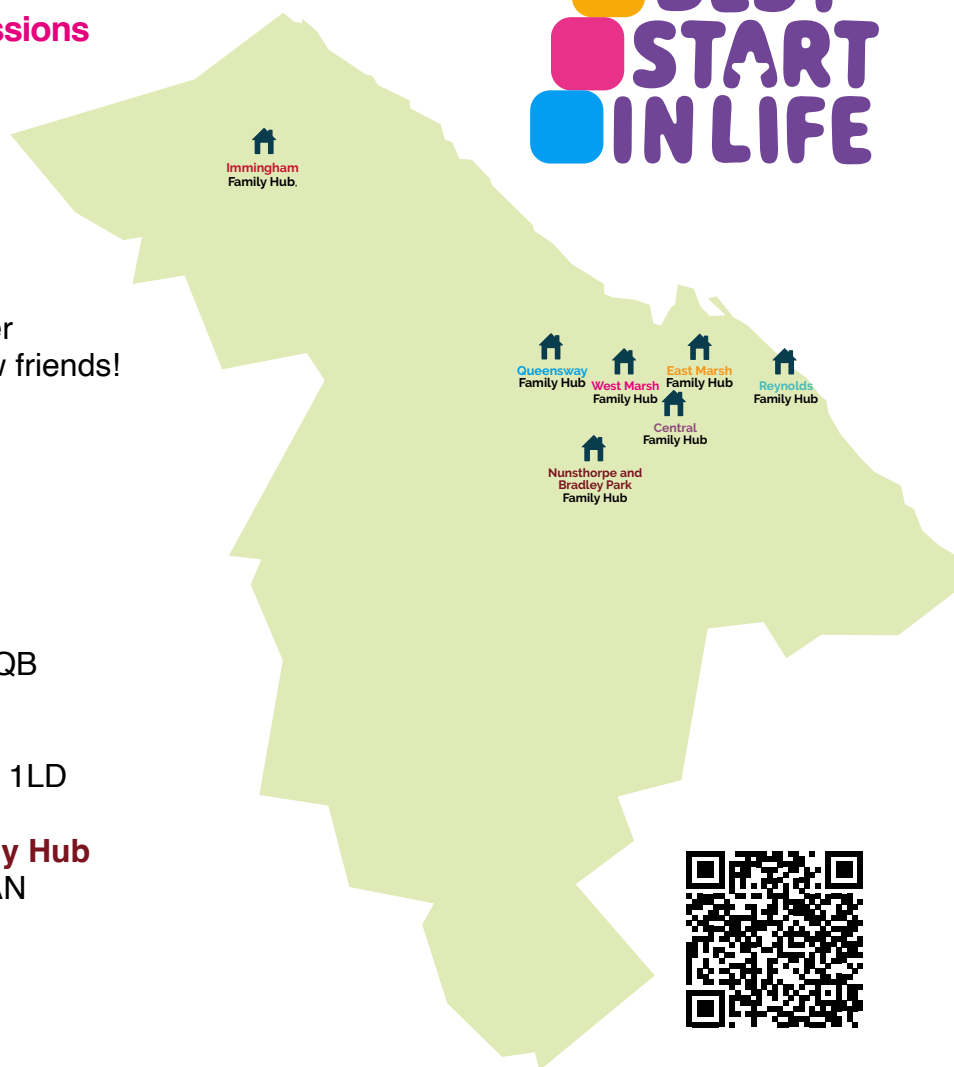

## Here for Families, Every Step of the Way

When Kim first came to Immingham Family Hub, Marlow was just five weeks old. She had heard about the infant feeding groups and baby massage and wanted some reassurance in those early days. "I had lots of questions," she says, "and it really helped to talk them through with people who understood."

Kim had recently moved to the area, and life felt unsettled. Her family



were staying with her husband's grandmother while their new home was being renovated, and she found herself away from friends and the support she was used to. "It was quite isolating," she explains. "I needed somewhere to go, even just to get out of the house for a bit."

The Family Hub quickly became that place. Kim started going regularly, joining different groups as Marlow grew. "It feels like a home from

home," she says. "The staff are really nice, and they always make time for you." She values the fact that there is always someone to listen. "If they do not know the answer, they will find it for you."

As Marlow moved along the Family Hub pathway, Kim found comfort in the routine and familiarity. Being welcomed by people who knew her and her child made a real difference. "They have seen my child grow up," she says. "That means a lot." The groups that the Family Hub put on cater for a range of ages/stages and facilitate play ideas that may not be achievable at home such as messy play and the staff will always take on board any ideas that families may want in following sessions.

Now Marlow is two, and the hub is still part of their lives. It remains a place of support, connection and reassurance. "They are always there if we need them," Kim says. For her, the Family Hub has been more than a service. It has been a steady presence during a time of change, offering warmth, understanding and a sense of belonging for both mum and child.

## That's because Horizon Youth Zone members can now get the bus for just £1.

Thanks to the council, Stagecoach East Midlands and Horizon young people can hop on a bus and get to the brilliant new youth zone – which is for 8 to 19-year-olds, and up to 25 for those with additional needs.

Membership costs just £5 a year and once there, there's so much to do – a boxing ring, 3G pitch, music room, gym, indoor court, climbing wall, arts & craft, film & multi-media, training kitchen, health & wellbeing – and more! The bus tickets for £1 can be used by members after 4pm on school days and all day on weekends and school holidays.

To make sure you get the discounted ticket, just show the driver your Horizon bus pass when getting on the bus. The offer is strictly for Youth Zone members and is not available to parents or carers. Scan the QR code on this page for information on how to get a bus pass. Since it opened in the former West Haven Maltings next to the River Freshney, Horizon has seen almost 4,000 young people registered and over 13,000 visits.

Inside the renovated listed building, there is so much to do - providing children and young people with a space to have fun, make friends and be active.

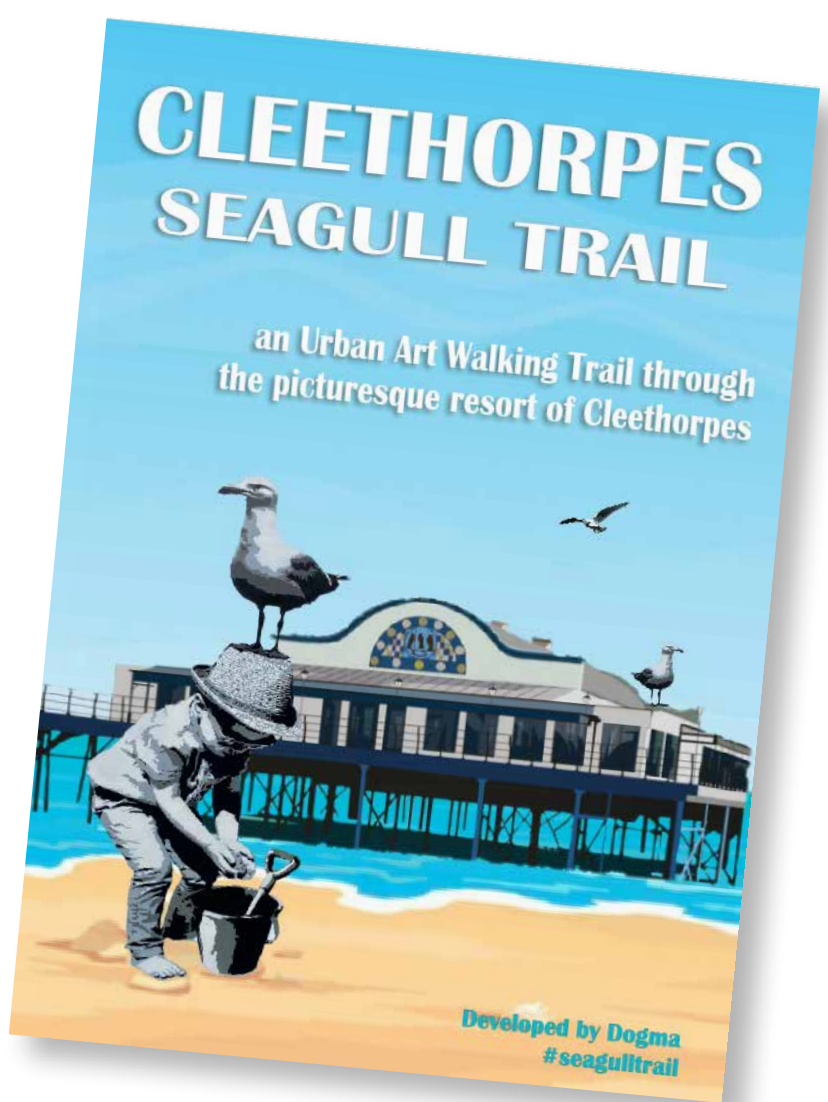
# Cleethorpes urban art trail updated for 2026

The Trin Centre is a friendly community space helping people get active, feel healthier, and stay connected.

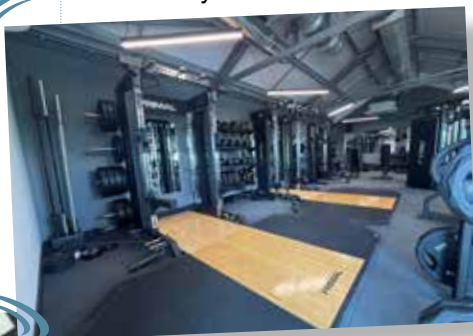
Run by Cleethorpes Community Sports & Education,

# Wendy's story: the Cleethorpes woman behind stop smoking campaign

Watching her mum struggle for breath in intensive care gave Wendy from Cleethorpes the motivation she needed to quit smoking. Sadly, her mum who had COPD from smoking died, but Wendy vowed to quit so that her daughter would never have to go through the same experience.

Today, Wendy lives a full, healthy and happy life, but her story could have been very different.

After 34 years of smoking, and with the help of her local stop smoking service, she was able to quit using an inhalator and patches. Unfortunately, seven years later, she was diagnosed with kidney cancer caused by smoking. The cancer was removed, but a year later she was told she had lung cancer also caused by smoking.

Wendy needed part of her lung removing to get rid of the cancer. Her surgeon explained that if she hadn't quit smoking, she may not have been able to have the surgery as her lung function would be so weak that the risk of surgery would be too high.

"I'm just so glad I quit when I did, she said. "Because I'd stopped smoking, my lungs were healthy enough for me to have the operation, so it's never too late to stop smoking even if you've got cancer.

Two years later, Wendy is feeling great. She's made a full recovery and has focused on improving her health. Now she's not smoking, she can breathe easier, exercise more and has lost four stone in weight.

Wendy has the following advice for anyone who still smokes: "You're never too old or too ill to quit – even if you've got a cancer, quitting smoking can lower the risk of it coming back. Do it for your family, I'm glad I did.

She is urging the 20,800 smokers in North East Lincolnshire to quit.

# Staying safe around the water this summer

Nothing beats spending time at the beach on a warm day in the summer, and in Cleethorpes we have a fantastic coastal beach on our doorstep!

However, whilst water is great for helping us to keep fit and cool down, it can pose hidden dangers.

Around half of all UK drownings occur between May and August and cold water can be dangerous even for strong swimmers as it can cause the body to go into shock. Tragically the May heatwave led to numerous tragedies around the country as people went in search of cold water but underestimated just how cold the sea and other watercourses are at this time of year.

We've included below some top tips for staying safe around water, so whether you're visiting the seaside with friends or family, you can help keep yourself and your loved ones out of danger.

## Stop and think before getting in:

Do your research before you get in – consider tide times, currents and water temperature.

Never jump into the sea, rivers or lakes from heights. Water temperature can be much lower below the surface and there may be shallow areas or hidden hazards which will cause serious injury.

Avoid using inflatables – they can get caught in the wind and risk being blown out to deeper waters.

**Stay together:** Try to stay close to busy areas, so if you do get into danger, there are plenty of people around to raise the alarm.

Don't go too far – enter the water slowly, stay close to the shore and don't go further than standing depth.



Always be supervised and if possible only swim in areas covered by lifeguards. If you do get into distress in the water, stay calm. Try to float on your back, and call for help.

If you see someone in difficulty, call 999 **immediately**. If you're at the coast, ask for the Coastguard.

The Maternal Wellbeing Service is a non judgemental, confidential service that can help you talk through your worries.

# Children's Health NEL

## Children's Health NORTH EAST LINCOLNSHIRE



## Here for Families, Every Step of the Way

The Health Visiting Service helps families from pregnancy until a child is around 4 years old.

Health visitors are trained nurses or midwives. They work with other team members who are also trained to support young children and families.

Health visitors meet families during pregnancy and through a child's early years. They check how the child is growing and how the family is doing. They give simple advice to help keep children safe and healthy.

This can include safe sleeping, brushing teeth, and feeding babies. They also help parents get ready for the next stage as their child grows.

Appointments are also a chance for parents to talk. They can share any worries about their child or themselves. The team understands that being a parent can sometimes feel hard. They listen, offer support, and can help families find other services if needed.

There are also drop-in sessions where families can come without an appointment. At these, parents can ask questions, get their baby weighed, or speak to someone if they are worried.

Families can also get in touch by phone or email - 01472 323660 [HealthVisitingAdvice@nelincs.gov.uk](mailto:HealthVisitingAdvice@nelincs.gov.uk). The service is available Monday to Friday 8.30-4.30pm.

The school nursing team supports children and young people aged 4 to 19 across North East Lincolnshire.

The team includes qualified nurses and practitioners who work closely with schools, families and other services. They help children stay healthy and ready to learn, following the Healthy Child Programme.

School nurses act as a link between health and education. They offer advice and support on a range of topics including healthy lifestyles, sleep, continence such as bedwetting, and managing medical conditions in school. They also support children moving between schools and help with any health concerns. If they cannot help directly, they will guide families to the right service.

They work in schools, at home and in the community, offering support in a way that suits each family. They also provide health education through assemblies, parent events and one to one appointments. In secondary schools, they offer support with relationships - keeping children safe is an important part of their role.

The team also carries out health checks in schools. This includes measuring height and weight in Reception and Year 6, and checking vision in Reception. Children and families often ask for help with emotional wellbeing, sleep and continence. The service is confidential and supportive. Families can refer themselves, or ask their school to help. Support can also be accessed by phone, email or through the Chat Health text service for young people aged 11 to 19.

## New neighbourhood board to help shape the future of Immingham

A new Immingham & Hougham Neighbourhood Board has been formed, bringing together 18 local representatives to help shape the long-term future of both communities through the Government's Pride in Place Programme.

Over the next decade, £20-million will be invested to support improvements and create better opportunities for residents. Immingham and Hougham are among 264 neighbourhoods selected to share in £5-billion of national funding announced last September.

The Board will oversee local delivery and ensure the funding achieves a lasting and meaningful impact. It is chaired by Andy Hopkins, Director of Operations at Immingham Town Council, with Elaine Norton, a local resident and Project Manager at One Voice Immingham,

serving as Vice Chair. Members represent a wide range of local organisations and sectors.

A community-led Immingham Town Plan has already identified key priorities, with further engagement planned to make sure investment reflects the needs of residents, including those in Hougham.

Andy Hopkins said: "The Pride in Place Programme is a fantastic opportunity for our community. A community-led Immingham Town Plan has already identified key priorities, and further work will take place with residents to ensure the money is spent in the right places. Hougham will also benefit from the fund and has representation on the Board."

# Landlords – have you signed up for the *East Marsh Selective Licensing Scheme?*



In October 2025 the Council approved the designation of an area of the East Marsh for a Selective Licensing Scheme. The designation came into force on 8 April 2026 and lasts for a period of five years.

Selective Licensing aims to improve housing management standards and reduce anti-social behaviour.

## What You Need to Know as a Landlord

If you are a landlord with a privately rented property in the Selective Licensing area (**see map**) you must now apply for a licence for each rental property you own.

## How to apply for a licence

Landlords must apply by October 8 2026 to avoid a late fee. After this date a late fee of £200 will apply.

- Fees are split into two parts;  
Part A £600 – non-refundable and payable on submission of an application  
Part B £400 – Once your application is approved in principle, you will be required to pay the remaining amount of the licence fee. Failure to pay this amount will result in your licence not being valid.

## Civil Penalties

It is an offence to rent a property in a designated area without applying for a Selective Licence. Landlords with unlicensed rented properties can face a financial penalty notice of up to £30,000 or an unlimited fine from the court. Landlords could also be ordered to repay up to 12 months' rent.

## Benefits for Good Landlords

This scheme helps to level the playing field by tackling rogue landlords who undermine the reputation of good ones. The licence will formally recognise your commitment to providing safe, well-maintained, and properly managed homes.

## Information for Residents: How Selective Licensing Benefits You

Selective Licensing has been introduced to an area of the East Marsh to ensure a safer, healthier, and more pleasant community for all residents.

## How does the scheme help you?

- Higher standards: The scheme requires all landlords to meet specific criteria for property condition and management. The council can take action against landlords who fail to meet these standards.
- Reduced anti-social behaviour: A key aim of the scheme is to address persistent problems caused by anti-social behaviour associated with private rental properties.
- Better managed properties: The licensing process will improve overall property management, meaning quicker resolution of problems for tenants.
- Safer homes: The scheme enforces important safety standards, including fire safety measures and gas and electrical safety checks.

# Renters' Rights

The new Renters' Rights Act came into effect on the 1 May 2026. If you are a private landlord, or rent your home, this is what you need to know.

- Tenancies are now moving to a simpler structure with no end date, they will work on a weekly or monthly rolling basis.
- Tenants will be given more time to find a home once they have been served an eviction notice. Possessions will be fair to both landlords and tenants.
- Private landlords can no longer unreasonably refuse pets.
- Private landlords can no longer increase rent to above market rates or accept offers above the advertised rent.
- Private landlords cannot discriminate against prospective tenants in receipt of benefits or with children.
- Later in 2026 a Private Rented Sector Ombudsman will be created to help resolve issues within the sector.

By the end of the year, more elements of the Act will come into place, with a national private rented sector ombudsman who will provide quick, fair, and impartial resolutions for complaints about landlords, alongside a private rented sector landlord database.

# Need fast financial help? Access **crisis payments** now!

The Council has launched a new service to help people in North East Lincolnshire get quick support if they have an unexpected money problem.

If you are a low-income household experiencing a sudden financial emergency (i.e. loss of job, or breakdown of a boiler) you can now apply for a crisis payment through the Crisis Resilience Fund. As well as crisis payments, you can also access longer-term support to prevent future crises.

The fund is for people living in North East Lincolnshire, and is run by North East Lincolnshire Council with funding from the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP).

## What is a Crisis Payment?

A **Crisis Payment** gives short-term help.

It is for people who are struggling **right now**.

It can help stop things getting worse.

## What help can you get?

If you are eligible, you may get:

- **Help with a one-off cost**
- **A supermarket voucher**
- **Essential household items, like: a fridge or cooker.**

You may also get **extra help**, such as:

- Help to **manage your money**
- **Debt advice**
- Support to **learn new skills**
- Help using **online services**

## How do you apply?

You must contact a **local support organisation** to apply.

They will talk to you about your situation; look at the money you have coming in and going out; apply for help for you, if you are eligible.


## You can apply through these local support organisations

- Centre4
- Foresight
- Creating Positive Opportunity
- Navigo (for Navigo service users only)
- Lincolnshire Housing Partnership (for LHP residents only)

The council will then:

- Check your application
- Check where you live
- Check any benefits you get
- Aim to respond within two working days

# Simpler recycling

here's what you need to know!

**More products than ever before can now be recycled thanks to the new Simpler Recycling rules.**

**Across North East Lincolnshire, Tetra Pak, clean aluminium foil/aluminium food trays and clean toothpaste tubes can now be put in the grey bin.**

Previously, all three were unable to be recycled and had to be placed in the green general waste bin. Now, life will be made simpler for residents with a clearer system for reducing waste and making the area a cleaner, greener place to live.



## What happens to your waste?

- **Recycling** - Mixed glass bottles and jars, aluminium food and drink cans, and plastic recycling from the grey bins and the community recycling centres are sent to various locations around the UK to be sorted, recycled and made into new items.

*Paper and cardboard are sent to Palm Paper, where they are recycled and made into newsprint and cardboard.*

- **Household domestic rubbish** - The rubbish that cannot be recycled collected in your green household waste bin is delivered to NEWLINCS Development to help drive a turbine to generate electricity. The heat and electricity are used in the facility itself.
- **Garden waste** - Green waste from grounds maintenance, households and the recycling centres are litter picked and shredded before being sent to Riby to be made into compost.

# #JustDont campaign launched

**With emotions poised to heighten during the FIFA Men's World Cup, a campaign is underway across the region to challenge everyday harassment and harmful behaviour faced by women and girls.**

Funded by the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Humberside, the #JustDont campaign aims to engage men to encourage a reduction in harassment, abuse and violence against women and girls by challenging the attitudes and actions of others.

With at least 86 per cent of young women in the UK having experienced sexual harassment in public spaces, #JustDont urges men and boys to be part of the solution to create safer nights out, streets and communities.

As we head into a World Cup summer, the campaign is seeking to make the prevention of all abuse the role of everyone so that we enjoy the festival of football together.

Police and Crime Commissioner for Humberside Jonathan Evison said: "Women and girls have the right to go about their lives without fear of any form of harassment.

"The #JustDont campaign urges men and boys to think about their own actions and those of others to help change abusive mindsets and culture.

"The World Cup this summer is the perfect time to kick the campaign into overdrive, with large gatherings, alcohol and heightened emotions. We want everyone to enjoy all of that together, in a safe, welcoming and respectful environment.

"To do that, we need men to challenge harmful jokes, speak out against disrespect and step in when they see abuse and harassment occurring.

"We can change the culture, promote respect and help end harassment and harmful behaviour."

Extensive research revealed that many young men can recognise inappropriate behaviour but often lack confidence to challenge it.

#JustDont has been designed in collaboration with young men aged 15 to 22 to empower their peers to step up and challenge friends in order to change the culture, with simple and practical ways to intervene in a safe manner.

#### **This includes:**

- Challenging mates – If you hear or see something that does not feel right, speak up. Call out unacceptable behaviour if safe to do so, change the subject or distract to de-escalate the situation and show support to the person affected.



- Support young men and boys – Behaviour may come from pressure, insecurity or not knowing what is acceptable. Encourage honest conversations about respect, emotions and mental health.
- Promote healthy relationships – Respecting boundaries, listening and always seeking consent are crucial in all relationships.
- Step in safely – If you see something worrying, take action. Check in with the person being targeted, involve staff or security and contact the police if someone is in danger.
- Share the campaign – Help raise awareness in schools, community groups and public spaces to start conversations that challenge behaviour and inspire change.

Campaign branding will be featured across the region's venues this summer to reinforce the message.

# Independent custody volunteers needed

**The Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Humberside is seeking residents from North East Lincolnshire to join our team.**

Independent custody volunteers (ICVs) are impartial individuals who make unannounced visits to police custody suites. You will speak with detainees to ensure they are treated fairly, check on their welfare, and monitor the conditions of the facilities.

It's a vital role that provides transparency and public reassurance.

Between April 2025 and March 2026, the team of volunteers made 100 visits to Humberside Police's two custody suites in Hull and Grimsby, speaking to more than 400 detainees.

The OPCC's ICV team has been recognised nationally for exceptional quality with a Platinum accreditation while 95 per cent of volunteers feel their work is valued.

## Funding boost for community projects

**A number of Community Safety Fund projects across North East Lincolnshire have received funding from the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Humberside in recent months.**

Grimsby Amateur Boxing Club has installed security fencing and gates along with mural boards that were designed and developed through youth engagement workshops, thanks to a grant of £20,682.

Oasis Charitable Trust received £33,252 for the installation of CCTV cameras and fencing at Oasis Academy.

Grimsby In Bloom was granted £12,818 for CCTV and fencing for The Pavilion in The Duke of York Gardens.

Grimsby and Cleethorpes Area Doorstep received £26,368 for CCTV, lighting and fencing at The Hub Community Centre.

The Grimsby Pastures for the benefit of the Enrolled Freeman of Grimsby was granted £34,871 for the installation of CCTV and lighting and Freeman Street Market.

**Welcome to my latest column and the opportunity to highlight the work my team and I have been involved in and are set to carry out in the coming months.**

We recently held our annual Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) Summit which has become an important fixture of the calendar as we seek to tackle the myriad of issues under the ASB banner.

The surveys we carry out with the public reveal that dealing with anti-social behaviour remains a high priority across our region. We know too that the impact on those who have suffered due to ASB can be hugely significant and have a major bearing on quality of life. It is something therefore that we take incredibly seriously as an organisation.

ASB is a catch-all term that encompasses so many issues with plenty of nuance with each of those. It is not simply the responsibility of the police to address ASB but rather they require a multi-agency approach, creating inevitable complications and challenges.

Individual issues can involve a combination of organisations, including housing, environmental and education, as well as policing, so collaborative working is vital to ensure problems do not fall through the cracks.

It was pleasing to join with representatives of our four local councils, including North East Lincolnshire Council, in signing the ASB Help Pledge which commits organisations to embedding best practice into policy and procedures. This aims to ensure victims of persistent ASB are given a voice and partners work together on problem-solving to reach a satisfactory outcome.

Our ASB Summit plays a vital role in bringing the range of organisations together to explore and strengthen collaboration, share ideas and workshop future approaches.

What is important to all of us is that victims are the priority and we are united in our efforts to ensure their needs and concerns are central to solutions.

I am pleased to say that there has been a significant reduction in the number of recorded instances of anti-social behaviour since I took office in 2021.

It is my determination, as we approach the end of the Police and Crime Commissioner role, that we provide solid foundations on which other organisations can build strong responses to ASB problems.

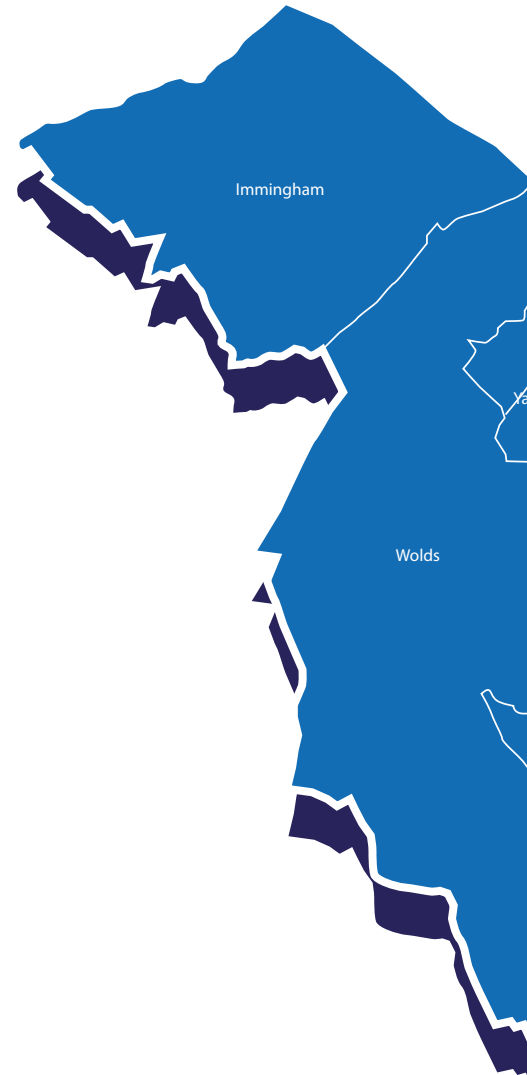

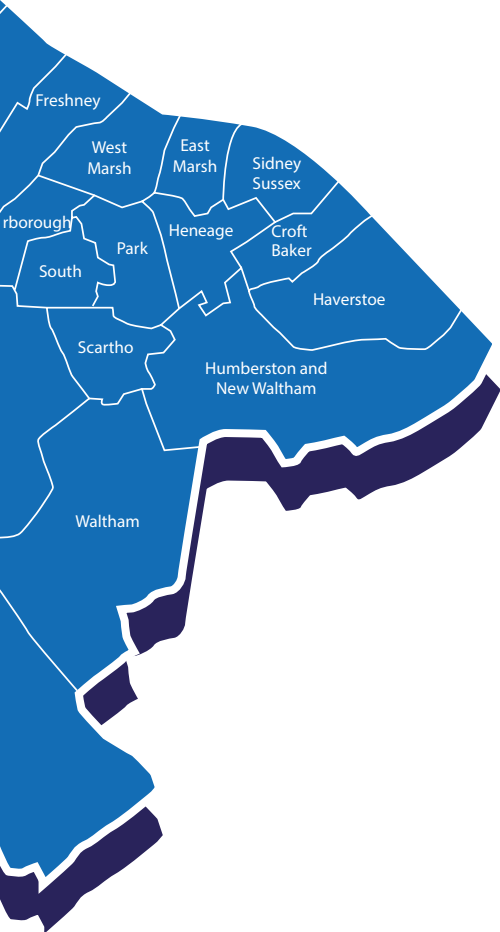

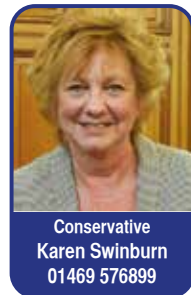
